# 60MHz Rail-to-Rail Input-Output V<sub>COM</sub> Amplifiers

The EL5611 and EL5811 are low power, high voltage rail-to-rail input-output amplifiers targeted primarily at  $V_{COM}$  applications in TFT-LCD displays. The EL5611 contains six amplifiers, and the EL5811 contains eight amplifiers. Operating on supplies ranging from 5V to 15V, while consuming only 2.5mA per amplifier, the EL5611 and EL5811 have a bandwidth of 60MHz (-3dB). They also provide common mode input ability beyond the supply rails, as well as rail-to-rail output capability. This enables these amplifiers to offer maximum dynamic range at any supply voltage.

The EL5611 and EL5811 also feature fast slewing and settling times, as well as a high output drive capability of 65mA (sink and source). In addition to  $V_{COM}$  applications, these features make these amplifiers ideal for high speed filtering and signal conditioning application. Other applications include battery power, portable devices, and anywhere low power consumption is important.

The EL5611 is available in 8-pin MSOP and 8-pin HMSOP packages. The EL5811 is available in space-saving 28-pin HTSSOP packages. These amplifiers operate over a temperature range of -40°C to +85°C.






FIGURE 1. INPUT OFFSET VOLTAGE DISTRIBUTION




FIGURE 3. INPUT OFFSET VOLTAGE vs TEMPERATURE




FIGURE 5. OUTPUT HIGH VOLTAGE vs TEMPERATURE




FIGURE 2. INPUT OFFSET VOLTAGE DRIFT




FIGURE 4. INPUT BIAS CURRENT vs TEMPERATURE




FIGURE 6. OUTPUT LOW VOLTAGE vs TEMPERATURE

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


FIGURE 7. OPEN-LOOP GAIN vs TEMPERATURE




FIGURE 9. SUPPLY CURRENT PER AMPLIFIER vs SUPPLY VOLTAGE




FIGURE 11. DIFFERENTIAL GAIN




FIGURE 8. SLEW RATE vs TEMPERATURE




FIGURE 10. SUPPLY CURRENT PER AMPLIFIER vs TEMPERATURE




FIGURE 12. DIFFERENTIAL PHASE




FIGURE 13. HARMONIC DISTORTION vs VOP-P




FIGURE 15. FREQUENCY RESPONSE FOR VARIOUS  $R_{\rm L}$ 




FIGURE 17. CLOSED LOOP OUTPUT IMPEDANCE




FIGURE 14. OPEN LOOP GAIN AND PHASE




FIGURE 16. FREQUENCY RESPONSE FOR VARIOUS  $C_L$ 




FIGURE 18. MAXIMUM OUTPUT SWING vs FREQUENCY




FIGURE 19. CMRR




FIGURE 21. INPUT VOLTAGE NOISE SPECTRAL DENSITY




FIGURE 23. SMALL-SIGNAL OVERSHOOT vs LOAD **CAPACITANCE** 





FIGURE 20. PSRR



**FIGURE 22. CHANNEL SEPARATION** 





FIGURE 24. SETTLING TIME vs STEP SIZE






FIGURE 25. LARGE SIGNAL TRANSIENT RESPONSE

### **Applications Information**

#### **Product Description**

The EL5611 and EL5811 voltage feedback amplifiers are fabricated using a high voltage CMOS process. They exhibit rail-to-rail input and output capability, are unity gain stable and have low power consumption (2.5mA per amplifier). These features make the EL5611, and EL5811 ideal for a wide range of general-purpose applications. Connected in voltage follower mode and driving a load of  $1k\Omega$ , the EL5611 and EL5811 have a -3dB bandwidth of 60MHz while maintaining a 75V/µs slew rate. The EL5611 a six channel amplifier, and the EL5811 an 8 channel amplifier.

#### Operating Voltage, Input, and Output

The EL5611and EL5811 are specified with a single nominal supply voltage from 5V to 15V or a split supply with its total range from 5V to 15V. Correct operation is guaranteed for a supply range of 4.5V to 16.5V. Most EL5611 and EL5811 specifications are stable over both the full supply range and operating temperatures of -40°C to +85°C. Parameter variations with operating voltage and/or temperature are shown in the typical performance curves.




FIGURE 27. OPERATION WITH RAIL-TO-RAIL INPUT AND OUTPUT

The input common-mode voltage range of the EL5611 and EL5811 extends 500mV beyond the supply rails. The output swings of the EL5611 and EL5811 typically extend to within 100mV of positive and negative supply rails with load currents of 5mA. Decreasing load currents will extend the output voltage range even closer to the supply rails. Figure 27 shows the input and output waveforms for the device in the unity-gain configuration. Operation is from  $\pm 5V$  supply with a  $1k\Omega$  load connected to GND. The input is a  $10V_{P-P}$  sinusoid. The output voltage is approximately  $9.8V_{P-P}$ .

#### **Short Circuit Current Limit**

The EL5611 and EL5811 will limit the short circuit current to  $\pm 180$ mA if the output is directly shorted to the positive or the negative supply. If an output is shorted indefinitely, the power dissipation could easily increase such that the device may be damaged. Maximum reliability is maintained if the output

continuous current never exceeds ±65mA. This limit is set by the design of the internal metal interconnects.

#### **Output Phase Reversal**




FIGURE 28. OPERATION WITH BEYOND-THE-RAILS INPUT

The EL5611 and EL5811 are immune to phase reversal as long as the input voltage is limited from  $V_{S^-}$ -0.5V to  $V_{S^+}$ +0.5V. Figure 28 shows a photo of the output of the device with the input voltage driven beyond the supply rails. Although the device's output will not change phase, the input's overvoltage should be avoided. If an input voltage exceeds supply voltage by more than 0.6V, electrostatic protection diodes placed in the input stage of the device begin to conduct and overvoltage damage could occur.

#### **Power Dissipation**

With the high-output drive capability of the EL5611 and EL5811 amplifiers, it is possible to exceed the 125°C 'absolute-maximum junction temperature' under certain load current conditions. Therefore, it is important to calculate the maximum junction temperature for the application to determine if load conditions need to be modified for the amplifier to remain in the safe operating area.

The maximum power dissipation allowed in a package is determined according to:

$$\mathsf{P}_{\mathsf{DMAX}} = \frac{\mathsf{T}_{\mathsf{JMAX}} - \mathsf{T}_{\mathsf{AMAX}}}{\Theta_{\mathsf{JA}}}$$

#### where:

- T<sub>JMAX</sub> = Maximum junction temperature
- T<sub>AMAX</sub> = Maximum ambient temperature
- Θ<sub>JA</sub> = Thermal resistance of the package
- P<sub>DMAX</sub> = Maximum power dissipation in the package

The maximum power dissipation actually produced by an IC is the total quiescent supply current times the total power supply voltage, plus the power in the IC due to the loads, or:

$$P_{DMAX} = \Sigma i [V_S \times I_{SMAX} + (V_S + -V_{OUT}i) \times I_{LOAD}i]$$

- i = 1 to 6 for EL5611 and 1 to 8 for EL5811
- V<sub>S</sub> = Total supply voltage
- I<sub>SMAX</sub> = Maximum supply current per amplifier
- V<sub>OUT</sub>i = Maximum output voltage of the application
- I<sub>LOAD</sub>i = Load current




FIGURE 29. PACKAGE POWER DISSIPATION VS AMBIENT TEMPERATURE




FIGURE 30. PACKAGE POWER DISSIPATION VS AMBIENT TEMPERATURE

If we set the two  $P_{DMAX}$  equations equal to each other, we can solve for  $R_{LOAD}$ i to avoid device overheat. Figures 29 and 30 provide a convenient way to see if the device will overheat. The maximum safe power dissipation can be found graphically, based on the package type and the ambient temperature. By using the previous equation, it is a simple matter to see if  $P_{DMAX}$  exceeds the device's power derating curves. To ensure proper operation, it is important to observe the recommended derating curves shown in Figures 29 & 30.

#### **Unused Amplifiers**

It is recommended that any unused amplifiers in a dual and a quad package be configured as a unity gain follower. The inverting input should be directly connected to the output and the non-inverting input tied to the ground plane.

## Power Supply Bypassing and Printed Circuit Board Layout

The EL5611 and EL5811 can provide gain at high frequency. As with any high-frequency device, good printed circuit board layout is necessary for optimum performance. Ground plane construction is highly recommended, lead lengths should be as short as possible and the power supply pins must be well bypassed to reduce the risk of oscillation. For normal single supply operation, where the  $V_{S^-}$  pin is connected to ground, a  $0.1\mu F$  ceramic capacitor should be placed from  $V_{S^+}$  to pin to  $V_{S^-}$  pin. A  $4.7\mu F$  tantalum capacitor should then be connected in parallel, placed in the region of the amplifier. One  $4.7\mu F$  capacitor may be used for multiple devices. This same capacitor combination should be placed at each supply pin to ground if split supplies are to be used.

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
