## **Description**

The JC050A, JC075A, JC100A Power Modules are dc-dc converters that operate over an input voltage range of 18 Vdc to 36 Vdc and provide a precisely regulated dc output. The outputs are fully isolated from the inputs, allowing versatile polarity configurations and grounding connections. The modules have maximum power ratings from 50 W to 100 W at typical full-load efficiency of 85%.

The sealed modules offer metal baseplate for excellent thermal performance. Threaded-through holes are provided to allow easy mounting or addition of a heat sink for high-temperature applications. The standard feature set includes remote sensing, output trim, and remote on/off for convenient flexibility in distributed power applications.

#### **Fusing Considerations**

### CAUTION: This power module is not internally fused. An input line fuse must always be used.

This encapsulated power module can be used in a wide variety of applications, ranging from simple stand-alone operation to an integrated part of a sophisticated power architecture. To preserve maximum flexibility, internal fusing is not included; however, to achieve maximum safety and system protection, always use an input line fuse. The safety agencies require a normal-blow, dc fuse with a maximum rating of 20 A (see Safety Considerations section). Based on the information provided in this data sheet on inrush energy and maximum dc input current, the same type of fuse with a lower rating can be used. Refer to the fuse manufacturer's data for further information.




Figure 1. Typical JC050A Input Characteristics at Room Temperature




Figure 3. Typical JC100A Input Characteristics at Room Temperature




Figure 2. Typical JC075A Input Characteristics at Room Temperature




Figure 4. Typical JC050A Output Characteristics at Room Temperature




Figure 5. Typical JC075A Output Characteristics at Room Temperature.




Figure 7. Typical JC050A Converter Efficiency vs.
Output Current at Room Temperature




Figure 6. Typical JC100A Output Characteristics at Room Temperature.




Figure 8. Typical JC075A Converter Efficiency vs.





Figure 9. Typical JC100A Converter Efficiency vs. **Output Current at Room Temperature** 






Figure 10. Typical JC100A Output Ripple Voltage at Room Temperature and 20 A Output




Figure 11. Typical JC100A Transient Response to Step Decrease in Load from 50% to 25% of Full Load at Room Temperature and 28 V Input (Waveform Averaged to Eliminate Ripple Component.)




Figure 12. Typical JC100A Transient Response to Step Increase in Load from 50% to 75% of Full Load at Room Temperature and 28 V Input (Waveform Averaged to Eliminate Ripple Component.)






Figure 13.Typical Start-Up from Remote On/Off JC100A1; Io = Full Load



## **Design Considerations**

## **Input Source Impedance**

The power module should be connected to a low ac-impedance input source. Highly inductive source impedances can affect the stability of the power module. For the test configuration in Figure 14, a 33  $\mu\text{F}$  electrolytic capacitor (ESR < 0.7  $\Omega$  at 100 kHz) mounted close to the power module helps ensure stability of the unit. For other highly inductive source impedances, consult the factory for further application guidelines.

## **Safety Considerations**

For safety-agency approval of the system in which the power module is used, the power module must be installed in compliance with the spacing and separation requirements of the end-use safety agency standard, i.e., *UL*-1950, *CSA* 22.2-950, and EN60950.

For the converter output to be considered meeting the requirements of safety extra-low voltage (SELV), the input must meet SELV requirements.

If the input meets extra-low voltage (ELV) requirements, then the converter's output is considered ELV.

The input to these units is to be provided with a maximum 20 A normal-blow fuse in the ungrounded lead.

# **Electrical Descriptions**

### **Current Limit**

To provide protection in a fault (output overload) condition, the unit is equipped with internal current-limiting circuitry and can endure current limiting for an unlimited duration. At the point of current-limit inception, the unit shifts from voltage control to current control. If the coutput voltage is pulled very low during a severe fault, the current-limit circuit can exhibit either foldback or tailout characteristics (output current decrease or increase). The unit operates normally once the output current is brought back into its specified range.

### **Feature Descriptions**

### Remote On/Off

Two remote on/off options are available. Positive logic remote on/off turns the module on during a logic-high voltage on the ON/OFF pin, and off during a logic low. Negative logic remote on/off turns the module off during a logic high and on during a logic low. Negative logic (code suffix "1") is the factory-preferred configuration.




Figure 17. Remote On/Off Implementation

To turn the power module on and off, the user must supply a switch to control the voltage between the on/ off terminal and the  $V_I(-)$  terminal ( $V_{On/off}$ ). The switch can be an open collector or equivalent (see Figure 17). A logic low is  $V_{On/off} = 0$  V to 1.2 V. The maximum  $I_{On/off}$  during a logic low is 1 mA. The switch should maintain a logic-low voltage while sinking 1 mA.

During a logic high, the maximum  $V_{on/off}$  generated by the power module is 15 V. The maximum allowable leakage current of the switch at  $V_{on/off}$  = 15 V is 50  $\mu$ A.

If not using the remote on/off feature, do one of the following:

- n For negative logic, short ON/OFF pin to V<sub>I</sub>(-)
- n For positive logic, leave ON/OFF pin open.

#### Remote Sense

Remote sense minimizes the effects of distribution losses by regulating the voltage at the remote-sense connections. The voltage between the remote-sense pins and the output terminals must not exceed the output voltage sense range given in the Feature Specifications table, i.e.:

 $[Vo(+) - Vo(-)] - [SENSE(+) - SENSE(-)] \le 0.5 \text{ V}$ 

## Feature Descriptions (continued)

### Remote Sense (continued)




Figure 18. Effective Circuit Configuration for Single-Module Remote-Sense Operation

The voltage between the  $V_0(+)$  and  $V_0(-)$  terminals must not exceed 5.9 V. This limit includes any increase in voltage due to remote-sense compensation and output voltage set-point adjustment (trim), see Figure 18.

If not using the remote-sense feature to regulate the output at the point of load, then connect SENSE(+) to Vo(+) and SENSE(-) to Vo(-) at the module.

## **Output Voltage Set-Point Adjustment** (Trim)




Figure 19. Circuit Configuration to Decrease **Output Voltage**

Output voltage trim allows the user to increase or decrease the output voltage set point of a module. This is accomplished by connecting an external resistor between the TRIM pin and either the SENSE(+) or SENSE(-) pins. With an external resistor between the TRIM and SENSE(-) pins (Radj-down), the output voltage set point (Vo, adj) decreases (see Figure 19). The following equation determines the required external-resistor value to obtain a percentage output voltage change of  $\Delta$ %.

Radj-down = 
$$\left(\frac{100}{\Lambda^{0/6}} - 2\right) k\Omega$$




Figure 20. Resistor Selection for Decreased **Output Voltage**

The test results for this configuration are displayed in Figure 20. This figure applies to all output voltages.




Figure 21. Circuit Configuration to Increase Output Voltage

With an external resistor connected between the TRIM and SENSE(+) pins (Radj-up), the output voltage set point (Vo, adj) increases (see Figure 21).

The following equation determines the required external-resistor value to obtain a percentage output voltage change of  $\Delta$ %.

$$\mbox{Radj-up} \; = \; \left( \frac{\mbox{Vo}(100 + \Delta\%)}{1.225 \Delta\%} - \frac{(100 + 2\Delta\%)}{\Delta\%} \right) \; \; k \Omega \label{eq:Radj-up} \;$$




Figure 22. Resistor Selection for Increased Output Voltage

The test results for this configuration are displayed in Figure 22.

The voltage between the Vo(+) and Vo(-) terminals must not exceed 5.9 V. This limit includes any increase in voltage due to remote-sense compensation and output voltage set-point adjustment (trim). See Figure 18.

If not using the trim feature, leave the TRIM pin open.

# **Output Overvoltage Clamp**

The ouput overvoltage clamp consists of control circuitry, independent of the primary regulation loop, that monitors the voltage on the output terminals. The control loop of the clamp has a higher voltage set point than the primary loop (see Feature specifications table). this provides a redundant voltage control that reduces the risk of output overvoltage.


## **Overtermperature Protection (Shutdown)**

The 100 W module features an overtemperature protection circuit to safeguard against thermal damage. The circuit shuts down the module when the maximum case temperature is exceeded. The module restarts automatically after cooling.

## **Thermal Considerations**

#### Introduction

The power modules operate in a variety of thermal environments; however, sufficient cooling should be provided to help ensure reliable operation of the unit. Heat-dissipating components inside the unit are thermally coupled to the case. Heat is removed by conduction, convection, and radiation to the surrounding environment. Proper cooling can be verified by measuring the case temperature. Peak temperature (Tc) occurs at the position indicated in Figure 23.

The temperature at this location should not exceed 100 °C. The output power of the module should not exceed the rated power for the module as listed in the Ordering Information table.

Although the maximum case temperature of the power modules is 100 °C, you can limit this temperature to a lower value for extremely high reliability.

For additional information on these modules, refer to the *Thermal Management JC-, JFC-, JW-, and JFW-Series* 50 W to 150 W Board-Mounted Power Modules Technical Note (TN97-008EPS).

## Thermal considerations (continued)

### **Heat Transfer Without Heat Sinks**




Figure 24. Forced Convection Power Derating with No Heat Sink; Either Orientation

Increasing airflow over the module enhances the heat transfer via convection. Figure 24 shows the maximum power that can be dissipated by the module without exceeding the maximum case temperature versus local ambient temperature (TA) for natural convection through 4 m/s (800 ft./min.).

Note that the natural convection condition was measured at 0.05 m/s to 0.1 m/s (10 ft./min. to 20 ft./min.); however, systems in which these power modules may be used typically generate natural convection airflow rates of 0.3 m/s (60 ft./min.) due to other heat dissipating components in the system. The use of Figure 24 is shown in the following example.

### Example

What is the minimum airflow necessary for a JC100A operating at nominal line, an output current of 20 A, and a maximum ambient temperature of 40 °C?

#### Solution

Given: VI = 28 V

lo = 20 A

T<sub>A</sub> = 40 °C

Determine PD (Use Figure 27.):

PD = 22.8 W

Determine airflow (v) (Use Figure 24.):

v = 2.7 m/s (540 ft./min.)




Figure 25. JC050A Power Dissipation vs. Output Current




Figure 26. JC075A Power Dissipation vs. Output Current




Figure 27. JC100A Power Dissipation vs. Output Current

# Thermal Considerations (continued) Heat Transfer with Heat Sinks

The power modules have through-threaded, M3 x 0.5 mounting holes, which enable heat sinks or cold plates to attach to the module. The mounting torque must not exceed 0.56 N–m (5 in.–lb.). For a screw attachment from the pin side, the recommended hole size on the customer's PWB around the mounting holes is 0.130  $\pm$  0.005 inches. If a larger hole is used, the mounting torque from the pin side must not exceed 0.25 N–m (2.2 in.–lb.).

Thermal derating with heat sinks is expressed by using the overall thermal resistance of the module. Total module thermal resistance ( $\theta$ ca) is defined as the maximum case temperature rise ( $\Delta$ Tc,  $_{max}$ ) divided by the module power dissipation (PD):

$$\theta \text{ca} = \left[\frac{\Delta T\text{C, max}}{\text{PD}}\right] = \left[\frac{\left(T\text{C} - T\text{A}\right)}{\text{PD}}\right]$$




Figure 28. Case-to-Ambient Thermal Resistance Curves; Either Orientation

The location to measure case temperature (Tc) is shown in Figure 23. Case-to-ambient thermal resistance vs. airflow is shown, for various heat sink configurations and heights, in Figure 28. These curves were obtained by experimental testing of heat sinks, which are offered in the product catalog.

These measured resistances are from heat transfer from the sides and bottom of the module as well as the top side with the attached heat sink; therefore, the case-to-ambient thermal resistances shown are generally lower than the resistance of the heat sink by itself. The module used to collect the data in Figure 28 had a

thermal-conductive dry pad between the case and the heat sink to minimize contact resistance. The use of Figure 28 is shown in the following example

### **Example**

If an 85 °C case temperature is desired, what is the minimum airflow necessary? Assume the JC100A module is operating at nominal line and an output current of 20 A, maximum ambient air temperature of 40 °C, and the heat sink is 0.5 in.

#### **Solution**

Given:  $V_1 = 28 \text{ V}$   $I_0 = 20 \text{ A}$   $T_A = 40 \text{ °C}$   $T_C = 85 \text{ °C}$ Heat sink = 0.5 in.

Determine PD by using Figure 27:

Then solve the following equation:

$$\theta ca = \left[ \frac{(Tc - TA)}{PD} \right]$$

$$\theta ca = \left[ \frac{(85 - 40)}{17} \right]$$

$$\theta ca = 1.97 \text{ °C/W}$$

Use Figure 28 to determine air velocity for the 0.5 inch heat sink.

The minimum airflow necessary for the JC100A module is 2.0 m/s (400 ft./min.).

## Thermal Considerations (continued)

#### **Custom Heat Sinks**




Figure 29. Resistance from Case-to-Sink and Sink-to-Ambient

A more detailed model can be used to determine the required thermal resistance of a heat sink to provide necessary cooling. The total module resistance can be separated into a resistance from case-to-sink ( $\theta$ cs) and sink-to-ambient ( $\theta$ sa) shown below (Figure 29).

For a managed interface using thermal grease or foils, a value of  $\theta$ cs = 0.1 °C/W to 0.3 °C/W is typical. The solution for heat sink resistance is:

$$\theta$$
sa =  $\left[\frac{(Tc - TA)}{PD}\right] - \theta cs$ 

This equation assumes that all dissipated power must be shed by the heat sink. Depending on the userdefined application environment, a more accurate model, including heat transfer from the sides and bottom of the module, can be used. This equation provides a conservative estimate for such instances.

## **Layout Considerations**

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
Copper paths must not be routed beneath the power module mounting inserts.






