GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The MX29LV400T/B is a 4-mega bit Flash memory organized as 512K bytes of 8 bits or 256K words of 16 bits. MXIC's Flash memories offer the most cost-effective and reliable read/write non-volatile random access memory. The MX29LV400T/B is packaged in 44-pin SOP, 48-pin TSOP and 48-ball CSP. It is designed to be reprogrammed and erased in system or in standard EPROM programmers.

The standard MX29LV400T/B offers access time as fast as 55ns, allowing operation of high-speed microprocessors without wait states. To eliminate bus contention, the MX29LV400T/B has separate chip enable ($\overline{CE}$) and output enable ($\overline{OE}$) controls.

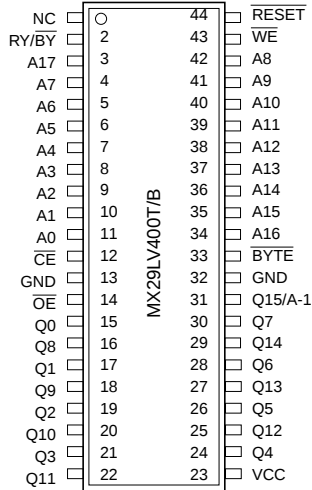
MXIC's Flash memories augment EPROM functionality with in-circuit electrical erasure and programming. The MX29LV400T/B uses a command register to manage this functionality. The command register allows for 100% TTL level control inputs and fixed power supply levels during erase and programming, while maintaining maximum EPROM compatibility.

MXIC Flash technology reliably stores memory contents even after 100,000 erase and program cycles. The MXIC cell is designed to optimize the erase and programming mechanisms. In addition, the combination of advanced tunnel oxide processing and low internal electric fields for erase and program operations produces reliable cycling. The MX29LV400T/B uses a 2.7V~3.6V VCC supply to perform the High Reliability Erase and auto Program/Erase algorithms.

The highest degree of latch-up protection is achieved with MXIC's proprietary non-epi process. Latch-up protection is proved for stresses up to 100 milliamps on address and data pin from -1V to VCC + 1V.

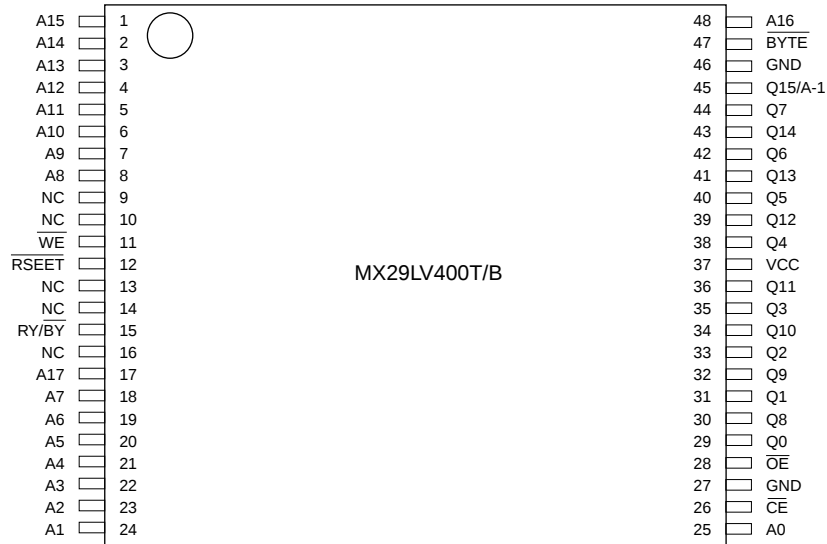

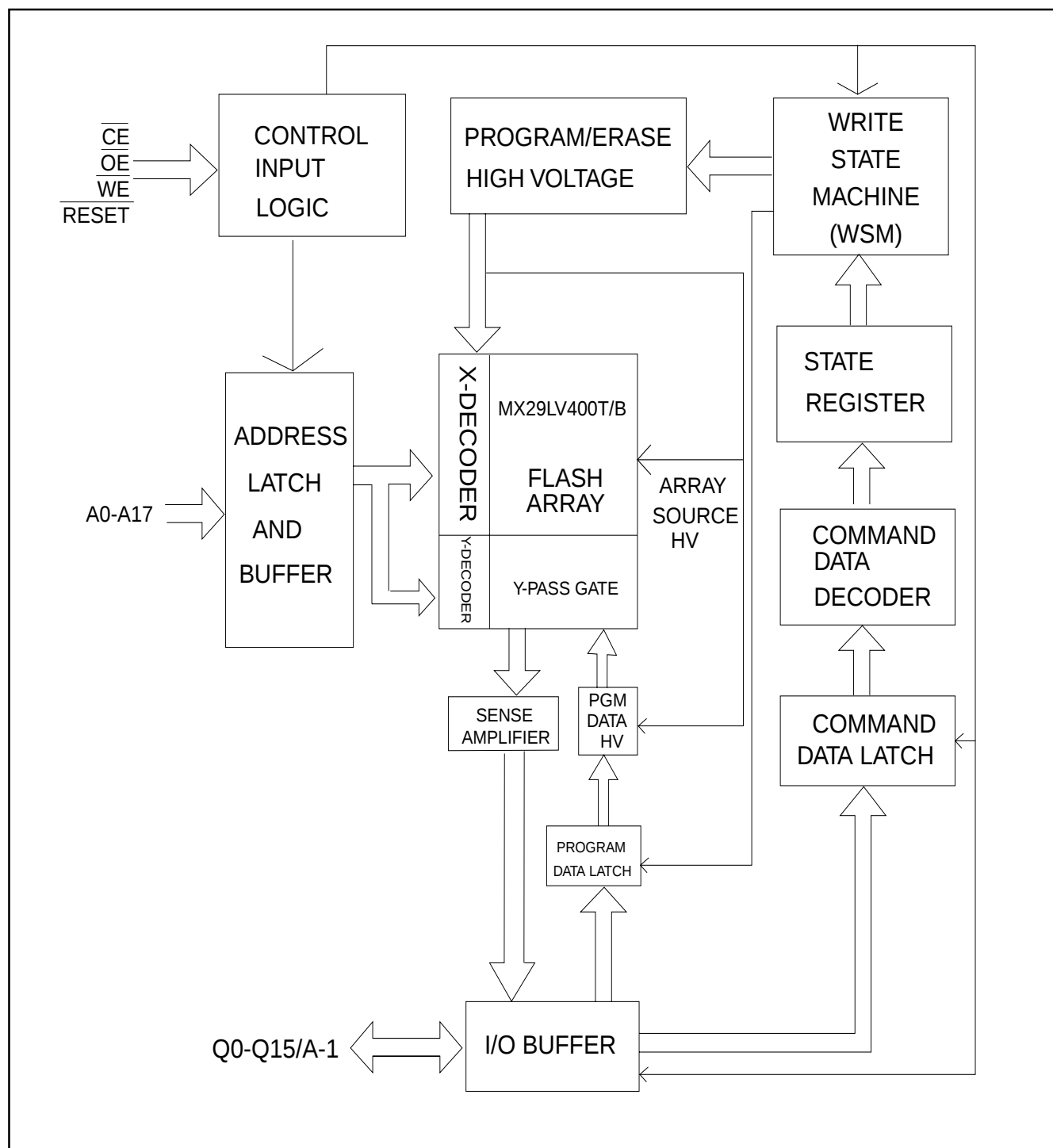

AUTOMATIC PROGRAMMING

The MX29LV400T/B is byte programmable using the Automatic Programming algorithm. The Automatic Programming algorithm makes the external system do not need to have time out sequence nor to verify the data programmed. The typical chip programming time at room temperature of the MX29LV400T/B is less than 10 seconds.

AUTOMATIC CHIP ERASE

The entire chip is bulk erased using 10 ms erase pulses according to MXIC's Automatic Chip Erase algorithm. Typical erasure at room temperature is accomplished in less than 25 second. The Automatic Erase algorithm automatically programs the entire array prior to electrical erase. The timing and verification of electrical erase are controlled internally within the device.

AUTOMATIC SECTOR ERASE

The MX29LV400T/B is sector(s) erasable using MXIC's Auto Sector Erase algorithm. The Automatic Sector Erase algorithm automatically programs the specified sector(s) prior to electrical erase. The timing and verification of electrical erase are controlled internally within the device. An erase operation can erase one sector, multiple sectors, or the entire device.

AUTOMATIC PROGRAMMING ALGORITHM

MXIC's Automatic Programming algorithm requires the user to only write program set-up commands (including 2 unlock write cycle and A0H) and a program command (program data and address). The device automatically times the programming pulse width, provides the program verification, and counts the number of sequences. The device provides an unlock bypass mode with faster programming. Only two write cycles are needed to program a word or byte, instead of four. A status bit similar to DATA polling and a status bit toggling between consecutive read cycles, provide feedback to the user as to the status of the programming operation. Refer to write operation status, table7, for more information on these status bits.

AUTOMATIC ERASE ALGORITHM

MXIC's Automatic Erase algorithm requires the user to write commands to the command register using standard microprocessor write timings. The device will automatically pre-program and verify the entire array. Then the device automatically times the erase pulse width, provides the erase verification, and counts the number of sequences. A status bit toggling between consecutive read cycles provides feedback to the user as to the status of the erasing operation.

Register contents serve as inputs to an internal state-machine which controls the erase and programming circuitry. During write cycles, the command register internally latches address and data needed for the programming and erase operations. During a system write cycle, addresses are latched on the falling edge, and data are latched on the rising edge of WE or CE, whichever happens first.

MXIC's Flash technology combines years of EPROM experience to produce the highest levels of quality, reliability, and cost effectiveness. The MX29LV400T/B electrically erases all bits simultaneously using Fowler-Nordheim tunneling. The bytes are programmed by using the EPROM programming mechanism of hot electron injection.

During a program cycle, the state-machine will control the program sequences and command register will not respond to any command set. During a Sector Erase cycle, the command register will only respond to Erase Suspend command. After Erase Suspend is completed, the device stays in read mode. After the state machine has completed its task, it will allow the command register to respond to its full command set.

AUTOMATIC SELECT

The automatic select mode provides manufacturer and device identification, and sector protection verification, through identifier codes output on Q7~Q0. This mode is mainly adapted for programming equipment on the device to be programmed with its programming algorithm. When programming by high voltage method, automatic select mode requires VID (11.5V to 12.5V) on address pin A9 and other address pin A6, A1 as referring to Table 3. In addition, to access the automatic select codes in-system, the host can issue the automatic select com-

mand through the command register without requiring VID, as shown in table4.

To verify whether or not sector being protected, the sector address must appear on the appropriate highest order address bit (see Table 1 and Table 2). The rest of address bits, as shown in table3, are don't care. Once all necessary bits have been set as required, the programming equipment may read the corresponding identifier code on Q7~Q0.

COMMAND DEFINITIONS

Device operations are selected by writing specific address and data sequences into the command register. Writing incorrect address and data values or writing them in the improper sequence will reset the device to the read mode. Table 4 defines the valid register command

sequences. Note that the Erase Suspend (B0H) and Erase Resume (30H) commands are valid only while the Sector Erase operation is in progress.

REQUIREMENTS FOR READING ARRAY DATA

To read array data from the outputs, the system must drive the $\overline{CE}$ and $\overline{OE}$ pins to VIL. $\overline{CE}$ is the power control and selects the device. $\overline{OE}$ is the output control and gates array data to the output pins. $\overline{WE}$ should remain at VIH.

The internal state machine is set for reading array data upon device power-up, or after a hardware reset. This ensures that no spurious alteration of the memory content occurs during the power transition. No command is necessary in this mode to obtain array data. Standard microprocessor read cycles that assert valid address on the device address inputs produce valid data on the device data outputs. The device remains enabled for read access until the command register contents are altered.

WRITE COMMANDS/COMMAND SEQUENCES

To program data to the device or erase sectors of memory, the system must drive $\overline{WE}$ and $\overline{CE}$ to VIL, and $\overline{OE}$ to VIH.

The device features an Unlock Bypass mode to facilitate faster programming. Once the device enters the Unlock Bypass mode, only two write cycles are required to program a byte, instead of four. The "byte Program Command Sequence" section has details on programming data to the device using both standard and Unlock Bypass command sequences.

An erase operation can erase one sector, multiple sectors, or the entire device. Table indicates the address space that each sector occupies. A "sector address" consists of the address bits required to uniquely select a sector. The "Writing specific address and data commands or sequences into the command register initiates device operations. Table 1 defines the valid register command sequences. Writing incorrect address and data values or writing them in the improper sequence resets the device to reading array data." section has details on erasing a sector or the entire chip, or suspending/resuming the erase operation.

After the system writes the autoselect command sequence, the device enters the autoselect mode. The system can then read autoselect codes from the internal register (which is separate from the memory array) on Q7-Q0. Standard read cycle timings apply in this mode.

Refer to the Autoselect Mode and Autoselect Command Sequence section for more information.

ICC2 in the DC Characteristics table represents the active current specification for the write mode. The "AC Characteristics" section contains timing specification table and timing diagrams for write operations.

STANDBY MODE

When using both pins of $\overline{CE}$ and $\overline{RESET}$, the device enters CMOS Standby with both pins held at $V_{CC} \pm 0.3V$. If $\overline{CE}$ and $\overline{RESET}$ are held at VIH, but not within the range of $V_{CC} \pm 0.3V$, the device will still be in the standby mode, but the standby current will be larger. During Auto Algorithm operation, V_{CC} active current (ICC2) is required even $\overline{CE} = "H"$ until the operation is completed. The device can be read with standard access time (tCE) from either of these standby modes, before it is ready to read data.

OUTPUT DISABLE

With the $\overline{OE}$ input at a logic high level (VIH), output from the devices are disabled. This will cause the output pins to be in a high impedance state.

RESET OPERATION

The $\overline{RESET}$ pin provides a hardware method of resetting the device to reading array data. When the $\overline{RESET}$ pin is driven low for at least a period of tRP, the device immediately terminates any operation in progress, tristates all output pins, and ignores all read/write commands for the duration of the $\overline{RESET}$ pulse. The device also resets the internal state machine to reading array data. The operation that was interrupted should be reinitiated once the device is ready to accept another command sequence, to ensure data integrity.

Current is reduced for the duration of the $\overline{RESET}$ pulse. When $\overline{RESET}$ is held at $V_{SS} \pm 0.3V$, the device draws CMOS standby current (ICC4). If $\overline{RESET}$ is held at VIL but not within $V_{SS} \pm 0.3V$, the standby current will be greater.

The $\overline{RESET}$ pin may be tied to system reset circuitry. A system reset would that also reset the Flash memory, enabling the system to read the boot-up firm-ware from

the Flash memory.

If $\overline{\text{RESET}}$ is asserted during a program or erase operation, the RY/BY pin remains a "0" (busy) until the internal reset operation is complete, which requires a time of tREADY (during Embedded Algorithms). The system can thus monitor RY/BY to determine whether the reset operation is complete. If $\overline{\text{RESET}}$ is asserted when a program or erase operation is completed within a time of tREADY (not during Embedded Algorithms). The system can read data tRH after the $\overline{\text{RESET}}$ pin returns to VIH.

Refer to the AC Characteristics tables for $\overline{\text{RESET}}$ parameters and to Figure 24 for the timing diagram.

READ/RESET COMMAND

The read or reset operation is initiated by writing the read/reset command sequence into the command register. Microprocessor read cycles retrieve array data. The device remains enabled for reads until the command register contents are altered.

If program-fail or erase-fail happen, the write of F0H will reset the device to abort the operation. A valid command must then be written to place the device in the desired state.

SILICON-ID READ COMMAND

Flash memories are intended for use in applications where the local CPU alters memory contents. As such, manufacturer and device codes must be accessible while the device resides in the target system. PROM programmers typically access signature codes by raising A9 to a high voltage (VID). However, multiplexing high voltage onto address lines is not generally desired system design practice.

The MX29LV400T/B contains a Silicon-ID-Read operation to supply traditional PROM programming methodology. The operation is initiated by writing the read silicon ID command sequence into the command register. Following the command write, a read cycle with A1=VIL, A0=VIL retrieves the manufacturer code of C2H/00C2H. A read cycle with A1=VIL, A0=VIH returns the device code of B9H/22B9H for MX29LV400T, BAH/22BAH for MX29LV400B.

SET-UP AUTOMATIC CHIP/SECTOR ERASE COMMANDS

Chip erase is a six-bus cycle operation. There are two "unlock" write cycles. These are followed by writing the "set-up" command 80H. Two more "unlock" write cycles are then followed by the chip erase command 10H or sector erase command 30H.

The Automatic Chip Erase does not require the device to be entirely pre-programmed prior to executing the Automatic Chip Erase. Upon executing the Automatic Chip Erase, the device will automatically program and verify the entire memory for an all-zero data pattern. When the device is automatically verified to contain an all-zero pattern, a self-timed chip erase and verify begin. The erase and verify operations are completed when the data on Q7 is "1" at which time the device returns to the Read mode. The system is not required to provide any control or timing during these operations.

When using the Automatic Chip Erase algorithm, note that the erase automatically terminates when adequate erase margin has been achieved for the memory array (no erase verification command is required).

If the Erase operation was unsuccessful, the data on Q5 is "1" (see Table 7), indicating the erase operation exceed internal timing limit.

The automatic erase begins on the rising edge of the last WE or CE pulse, whichever happens first in the command sequence and terminates when the data on Q7 is "1" at which time the device returns to the Read mode, or the data on Q6 stops toggling for two consecutive read cycles at which time the device returns to the Read mode.

READING ARRAY DATA

The device is automatically set to reading array data after device power-up. No commands are required to retrieve data. The device is also ready to read array data after completing an Automatic Program or Automatic Erase algorithm.

After the device accepts an Erase Suspend command, the device enters the Erase Suspend mode. The system can read array data using the standard read timings, except that if it reads at an address within erase-suspended sectors, the device outputs status data. After completing a programming operation in the Erase Suspend mode, the system may once again read array data with the same exception. See "Erase Suspend/Resume Commands" for more information on this mode. The system must issue the reset command to re-enable the device for reading array data if Q5 goes high, or while in the autoselect mode. See the "Reset Command" section, next.

RESET COMMAND

Writing the reset command to the device resets the device to reading array data. Address bits are don't care for this command.

The reset command may be written between the sequence cycles in an erase command sequence before erasing begins. This resets the device to reading array data. Once erasure begins, however, the device ignores reset commands until the operation is complete.

The reset command may be written between the sequence cycles in a program command sequence before programming begins. This resets the device to reading array data (also applies to programming in Erase Suspend mode). Once programming begins, however, the device ignores reset commands until the operation is complete.

The reset command may be written between the sequence cycles in an SILICON ID READ command sequence. Once in the SILICON ID READ mode, the reset command must be written to return to reading array data (also applies to SILICON ID READ during Erase Suspend).

If Q5 goes high during a program or erase operation, writing the reset command returns the device to reading array data (also applies during Erase Suspend).

SECTOR ERASE COMMANDS

The Automatic Sector Erase does not require the device to be entirely pre-programmed prior to executing the Automatic Sector Erase Set-up command and Automatic Sector Erase command. Upon executing the Automatic Sector Erase command, the device will automatically program and verify the sector(s) memory for an all-zero data pattern. The system is not required to provide any control or timing during these operations.

When the sector(s) is automatically verified to contain an all-zero pattern, a self-timed sector erase and verify begin. The erase and verify operations are complete when either the data on Q7 is "1" at which time the device returns to the Read mode, or the data on Q6 stops toggling for two consecutive read cycles at which time the device returns to the Read mode. The system is not required to provide any control or timing during these operations.

When using the Automatic sector Erase algorithm, note that the erase automatically terminates when adequate

erase margin has been achieved for the memory array (no erase verification command is required). Sector erase is a six-bus cycle operation. There are two "unlock" write cycles. These are followed by writing the set-up command 80H. Two more "unlock" write cycles are then followed by the sector erase command 30H. The sector address is latched on the falling edge of $\overline{WE}$ or $\overline{CE}$, whichever happens later, while the command(data) is latched on the rising edge of $\overline{WE}$ or $\overline{CE}$, whichever happens first. Sector addresses selected are loaded into internal register on the sixth falling edge of $\overline{WE}$ or $\overline{CE}$, whichever happens later. Each successive sector load cycle started by the falling edge of $\overline{WE}$ or $\overline{CE}$, whichever happens later must begin within 50us from the rising edge of the preceding $\overline{WE}$ or $\overline{CE}$, whichever happens first. Otherwise, the loading period ends and internal auto sector erase cycle starts. (Monitor Q3 to determine if the sector erase timer window is still open, see section Q3, Sector Erase Timer.) Any command other than Sector Erase(30H) or Erase Suspend(B0H) during the time-out period resets the device to read mode.

ERASE SUSPEND

This command only has meaning while the state machine is executing Automatic Sector Erase operation, and therefore will only be responded during Automatic Sector Erase operation. When the Erase Suspend command is written during a sector erase operation, the device requires a maximum of 20 μ s to suspend the erase operations. However, When the Erase Suspend command is written during the sector erase time-out, the device immediately terminates the time-out period and suspends the erase operation. After this command has been executed, the command register will initiate erase suspend mode. The state machine will return to read mode automatically after suspend is ready. At this time, state machine only allows the command register to respond to the Read Memory Array, Erase Resume and program commands.

The system can determine the status of the program operation using the Q7 or Q6 status bits, just as in the standard program operation. After an erase-suspend program operation is complete, the system can once again read array data within non-suspended sectors.

ERASE RESUME

This command will cause the command register to clear the suspend state and return back to Sector Erase mode but only if an Erase Suspend command was previously issued. Erase Resume will not have any effect in all other conditions. Another Erase Suspend command can be written after the chip has resumed erasing.

AUTOMATIC PROGRAM COMMANDS

To initiate Automatic Program mode, A three-cycle command sequence is required. There are two "unlock" write cycles. These are followed by writing the Automatic Program command A0H.

Once the Automatic Program command is initiated, the next WE pulse causes a transition to an active programming operation. Addresses are latched on the falling edge, and data are internally latched on the rising edge of the WE or CE, whichever happens first. The rising edge of WE or CE, whichever happens first, also begins the programming operation. The system is not required to provide further controls or timings. The device will automatically provide an adequate internally generated program pulse and verify margin.

The device provides Q2, Q3, Q5, Q6, Q7, and RY/BY to determine the status of a write operation. If the program operation was unsuccessful, the data on Q5 is "1" (see Table 7), indicating the program operation exceed internal timing limit. The automatic programming operation is completed when the data read on Q6 stops toggling for two consecutive read cycles and the data on Q7 and Q6 are equivalent to data written to these two bits, at which time the device returns to the Read mode (no program verify command is required).

WORD/BYTE PROGRAM COMMAND SEQUENCE

The device programs one byte of data for each program operation. The command sequence requires four bus cycles, and is initiated by writing two unlock write cycles, followed by the program set-up command. The program address and data are written next, which in turn initiate the Embedded Program algorithm. The system is not required to provide further controls or timings. The device automatically generates the program pulses and verifies the programmed cell margin. Table 1 shows the address and data requirements for the byte program command sequence.

When the Embedded Program algorithm is complete, the device then returns to reading array data and addresses are no longer latched. The system can determine the status of the program operation by using Q7, Q6, or RY/BY. See "Write Operation Status" for information on these status bits.

Any commands written to the device during the Embedded Program Algorithm are ignored. Note that a hardware reset immediately terminates the programming operation. The Byte Program command sequence should be reinitiated once the device has reset to reading array data, to ensure data integrity.

Programming is allowed in any sequence and across sector boundaries. A bit cannot be programmed from a "0" back to a "1". Attempting to do so may halt the operation and set Q5 to "1", or cause the Data Polling algorithm to indicate the operation was successful. However, a succeeding read will show that the data is still "0". Only erase operations can convert a "0" to a "1".

WRITE OPERATION STATUS

The device provides several bits to determine the status of a write operation: Q2, Q3, Q5, Q6, Q7, and RY/BY. Table 10 and the following subsections describe the

functions of these bits. Q7, $\overline{\text{RY/BY}}$, and DQ6 each offer a method for determining whether a program or erase operation is complete or in progress. These three bits are discussed first.

Q7: Data Polling

The Data Polling bit, Q7, indicates to the host system whether an Automatic Algorithm is in progress or completed, or whether the device is in Erase Suspend. Data Polling is valid after the rising edge of the final $\overline{\text{WE}}$ pulse in the program or erase command sequence.

During the Automatic Program algorithm, the device outputs on Q7 the complement of the datum programmed to Q7. This Q7 status also applies to programming during Erase Suspend. When the Automatic Program algorithm is complete, the device outputs the datum programmed to Q7. The system must provide the program address to read valid status information on Q7. If a program address falls within a protected sector, Data Polling on Q7 is active for approximately 1 us, then the device returns to reading array data.

During the Automatic Erase algorithm, Data Polling produces a "0" on Q7. When the Automatic Erase algorithm is complete, or if the device enters the Erase Suspend mode, Data Polling produces a "1" on Q7. This is analogous to the complement/true datum output described for the Automatic Program algorithm: the erase function changes all the bits in a sector to "1" prior to this, the device outputs the "complement," or "0." The system must provide an address within any of the sectors selected for erasure to read valid status information on Q7.

After an erase command sequence is written, if all sectors selected for erasing are protected, Data Polling on Q7 is active for approximately 100 us, then the device returns to reading array data. If not all selected sectors are protected, the Automatic Erase algorithm erases the unprotected sectors, and ignores the selected sectors that are protected.

When the system detects Q7 has changed from the complement to true data, it can read valid data at Q7-Q0 on the following read cycles. This is because Q7 may change asynchronously with Q0-Q6 while Output Enable ($\overline{\text{OE}}$) is asserted low.

$\overline{\text{RY/BY}}$: Ready/Busy

The $\overline{\text{RY/BY}}$ is a dedicated, open-drain output pin that indicates whether an Automatic Erase/Program algorithm is in progress or complete. The $\overline{\text{RY/BY}}$ status is valid after the rising edge of the final $\overline{\text{WE}}$ or $\overline{\text{CE}}$, whichever happens first, in the command sequence. Since $\overline{\text{RY/BY}}$ is an open-drain output, several $\overline{\text{RY/BY}}$ pins can be tied together in parallel with a pull-up resistor to Vcc.

If the output is low (Busy), the device is actively erasing or programming. (This includes programming in the Erase Suspend mode.) If the output is high (Ready), the device is ready to read array data (including during the Erase Suspend mode), or is in the standby mode.

Table 7 shows the outputs for $\overline{\text{RY/BY}}$ during write operation.

Q6: Toggle BIT I

Toggle Bit I on Q6 indicates whether an Automatic Program or Erase algorithm is in progress or complete, or whether the device has entered the Erase Suspend mode. Toggle Bit I may be read at any address, and is valid after the rising edge of the final $\overline{\text{WE}}$ or $\overline{\text{CE}}$, whichever happens first, in the command sequence (prior to the program or erase operation), and during the sector timeout.

During an Automatic Program or Erase algorithm operation, successive read cycles to any address cause Q6 to toggle. The system may use either $\overline{\text{OE}}$ or $\overline{\text{CE}}$ to control the read cycles. When the operation is complete, Q6 stops toggling.

After an erase command sequence is written, if all sectors selected for erasing are protected, Q6 toggles and returns to reading array data. If not all selected sectors are protected, the Automatic Erase algorithm erases the unprotected sectors, and ignores the selected sectors that are protected.

The system can use Q6 and Q2 together to determine whether a sector is actively erasing or is erase suspended. When the device is actively erasing (that is, the Automatic Erase algorithm is in progress), Q6 toggling. When the device enters the Erase Suspend mode, Q6 stops toggling. However, the system must also use Q2 to determine which sectors are erasing or erase-suspended. Alternatively, the system can use Q7.

If a program address falls within a protected sector, Q6 toggles for approximately 2 us after the program command sequence is written, then returns to reading array data.

Q6 also toggles during the erase-suspend-program mode, and stops toggling once the Automatic Program algorithm is complete.

Table 7 shows the outputs for Toggle Bit I on Q6.

Q2:Toggle Bit II

The "Toggle Bit II" on Q2, when used with Q6, indicates whether a particular sector is actively erasing (that is, the Automatic Erase algorithm is in process), or whether that sector is erase-suspended. Toggle Bit II is valid after the rising edge of the final $\overline{WE}$ or $\overline{CE}$, whichever happens first, in the command sequence.

Q2 toggles when the system reads at addresses within those sectors that have been selected for erasure. (The system may use either $\overline{OE}$ or $\overline{CE}$ to control the read cycles.) But Q2 cannot distinguish whether the sector is actively erasing or is erase-suspended. Q6, by comparison, indicates whether the device is actively erasing, or is in Erase Suspend, but cannot distinguish which sectors are selected for erasure. Thus, both status bits are required for sectors and mode information. Refer to Table 7 to compare outputs for Q2 and Q6.

Reading Toggle Bits Q6/ Q2

Whenever the system initially begins reading toggle bit status, it must read Q7-Q0 at least twice in a row to determine whether a toggle bit is toggling. Typically, the system would note and store the value of the toggle bit after the first read. After the second read, the system would compare the new value of the toggle bit with the first. If the toggle bit is not toggling, the device has completed the program or erase operation. The system can read array data on Q7-Q0 on the following read cycle.

However, if after the initial two read cycles, the system determines that the toggle bit is still toggling, the system also should note whether the value of Q5 is high (see the section on Q5). If it is, the system should then determine again whether the toggle bit is toggling, since the toggle bit may have stopped toggling just as Q5 went

high. If the toggle bit is no longer toggling, the device has successfully completed the program or erase operation. If it is still toggling, the device did not complete the operation successfully, and the system must write the reset command to return to reading array data.

The remaining scenario is that system initially determines that the toggle bit is toggling and Q5 has not gone high. The system may continue to monitor the toggle bit and Q5 through successive read cycles, determining the status as described in the previous paragraph. Alternatively, it may choose to perform other system tasks. In this case, the system must start at the beginning of the algorithm when it returns to determine the status of the operation.

Q5 Exceeded Timing Limits

Q5 will indicate if the program or erase time has exceeded the specified limits(internal pulse count). Under these conditions Q5 will produce a "1". This time-out condition indicates that the program or erase cycle was not successfully completed. Data Polling and Toggle Bit are the only operating functions of the device under this condition.

If this time-out condition occurs during sector erase operation, it specifies that a particular sector is bad and it may not be reused. However, other sectors are still functional and may be used for the program or erase operation. The device must be reset to use other sectors. Write the Reset command sequence to the device, and then execute program or erase command sequence. This allows the system to continue to use the other active sectors in the device.

If this time-out condition occurs during the chip erase operation, it specifies that the entire chip is bad or combination of sectors are bad.

If this time-out condition occurs during the byte programming operation, it specifies that the entire sector containing that byte is bad and this sector may not be reused, (other sectors are still functional and can be reused).

The time-out condition will not appear if a user tries to program a non blank location without erasing. Please note that this is not a device failure condition since the device was incorrectly used.

Q3

Sector Erase Timer

After the completion of the initial sector erase command sequence, the sector erase time-out will begin. Q3 will remain low until the time-out is complete. Data Polling and Toggle Bit are valid after the initial sector erase command sequence.

If $\overline{\text{Data Polling}}$ or the Toggle Bit indicates the device has been written with a valid erase command, Q3 may be used to determine if the sector erase timer window is still open. If Q3 is high ("1") the internally controlled erase cycle has begun; attempts to write subsequent commands to the device will be ignored until the erase operation is completed as indicated by $\overline{\text{Data Polling}}$ or Toggle Bit. If Q3 is low ("0"), the device will accept additional sector erase commands. To insure the command has been accepted, the system software should check the status of Q3 prior to and following each subsequent sector erase command. If Q3 were high on the second status check, the command may not have been accepted.

DATA PROTECTION

The MX29LV400T/B is designed to offer protection against accidental erasure or programming caused by spurious system level signals that may exist during power transition. During power up the device automatically resets the state machine in the Read mode. In addition, with its control register architecture, alteration of the memory contents only occurs after successful completion of specific command sequences. The device also incorporates several features to prevent inadvertent write cycles resulting from VCC power-up and power-down transition or system noise.

WRITE PULSE "GLITCH" PROTECTION

Noise pulses of less than 5ns(typical) on $\overline{\text{CE}}$ or $\overline{\text{WE}}$ will not initiate a write cycle.

LOGICAL INHIBIT

Writing is inhibited by holding any one of $\overline{\text{OE}} = \text{VIL}$, $\overline{\text{CE}} = \text{VIH}$ or $\overline{\text{WE}} = \text{VIH}$. To initiate a write cycle $\overline{\text{CE}}$ and $\overline{\text{WE}}$ must be a logical zero while $\overline{\text{OE}}$ is a logical one.

POWER SUPPLY DECOUPLING

In order to reduce power switching effect, each device should have a 0.1uF ceramic capacitor connected between its VCC and GND.

POWER-UP SEQUENCE

The MX29LV400T/B powers up in the Read only mode. In addition, the memory contents may only be altered after successful completion of the predefined command sequences.

TEMPORARY SECTOR UNPROTECT

This feature allows temporary unprotection of previously protected sector to change data in-system. The Temporary Sector Unprotect mode is activated by setting the RESET pin to VID(11.5V-12.5V). During this mode, formerly protected sectors can be programmed or erased as un-protected sector. Once VID is remove from the RESET pin, all the previously protected sectors are protected again.

SECTOR PROTECTION

The MX29LV400T/B features hardware sector protection. This feature will disable both program and erase operations for these sectors protected. To activate this mode, the programming equipment must force VID on address pin A9 and $\overline{\text{OE}}$ (suggest VID = 12V). Programming of the protection circuitry begins on the falling edge of the $\overline{\text{WE}}$ pulse and is terminated on the rising edge. Please refer to sector protect algorithm and waveform.

To verify programming of the protection circuitry, the programming equipment must force VID on address pin A9 (with $\overline{\text{CE}}$ and $\overline{\text{OE}}$ at VIL and $\overline{\text{WE}}$ at VIH). When A1=VIH, A0=VIL, A6=VIL, it will produce a logical "1" code at device output Q0 for a protected sector. Otherwise the device will produce 00H for the unprotected sector. In this mode, the addresses, except for A1, are don't care. Address locations with A1 = VIL are reserved to read manufacturer and device codes.(Read Silicon ID)

It is also possible to determine if the sector is protected in the system by writing a Read Silicon ID command. Performing a read operation with A1=VIH, it will produce a logical "1" at Q0 for the protected sector.

CHIP UNPROTECT

The MX29LV400T/B also features the chip unprotect mode, so that all sectors are unprotected after chip unprotect is completed to incorporate any changes in the code. It is recommended to protect all sectors before activating chip unprotect mode.

To activate this mode, the programming equipment must force VID on control pin $\overline{OE}$ and address pin A9. The $\overline{CE}$ pins must be set at VIL. Pins A6 must be set to VIH. (see Table 2) Refer to chip unprotect algorithm and waveform for the chip unprotect algorithm. The unprotection mechanism begins on the falling edge of the $\overline{WE}$ pulse and is terminated on the rising edge.

It is also possible to determine if the chip is unprotected in the system by writing the Read Silicon ID command. Performing a read operation with A1=VIH, it will produce 00H at data outputs(Q0-Q7) for an unprotected sector.

It is noted that all sectors are unprotected after the chip unprotect algorithm is completed.

Figure 1. SWITCHING TEST CIRCUITS

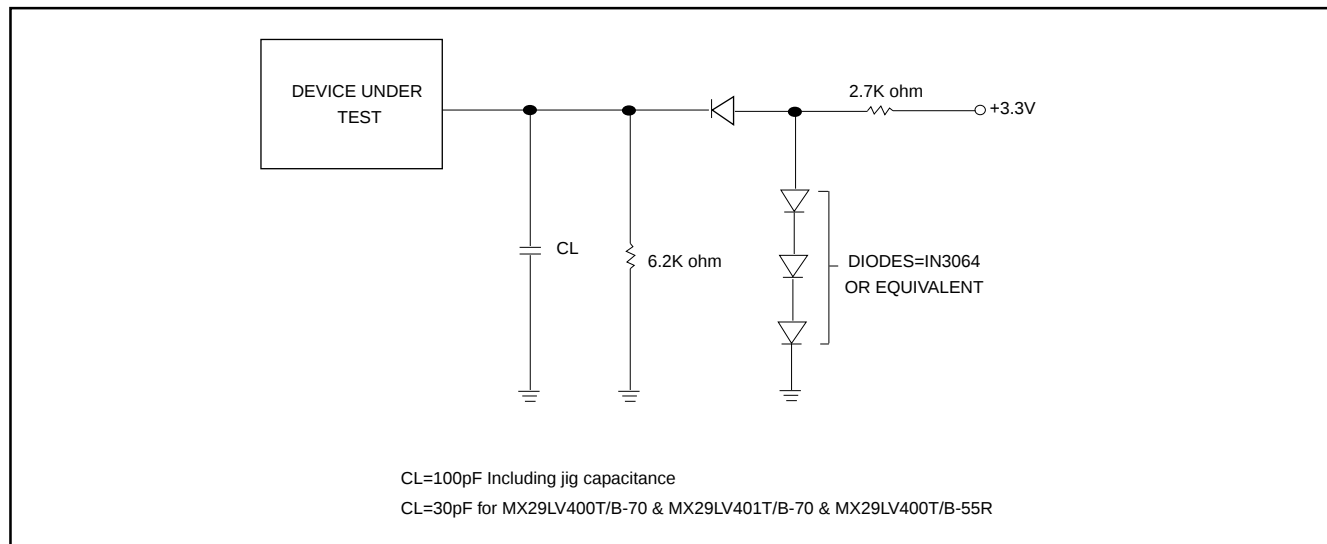


Figure 2. SWITCHING TEST WAVEFORMS

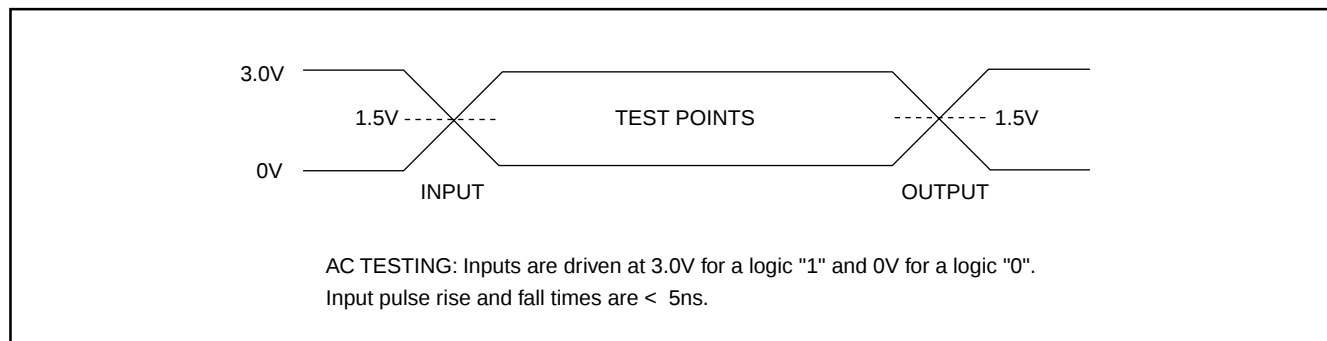
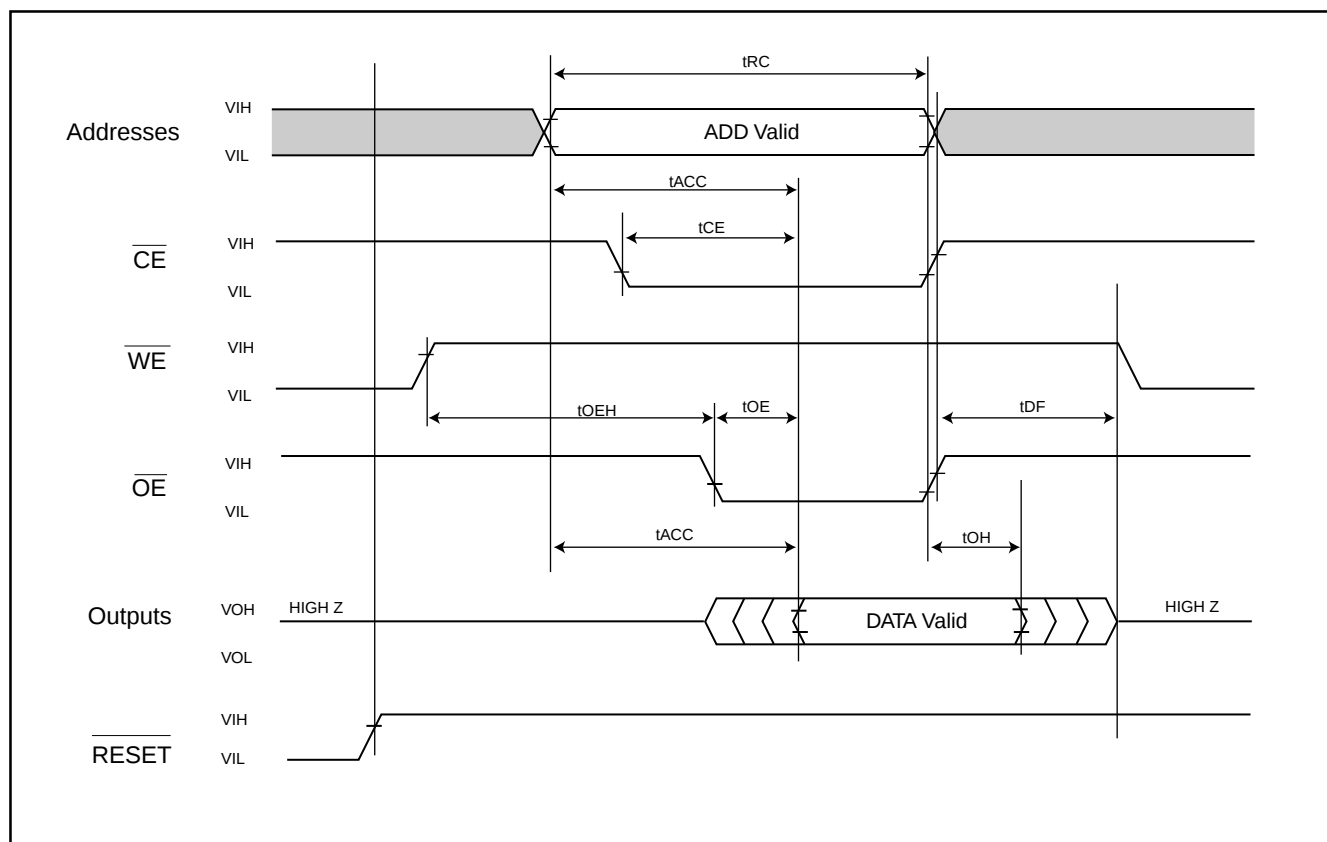


Figure 3. READ TIMING WAVEFORMS

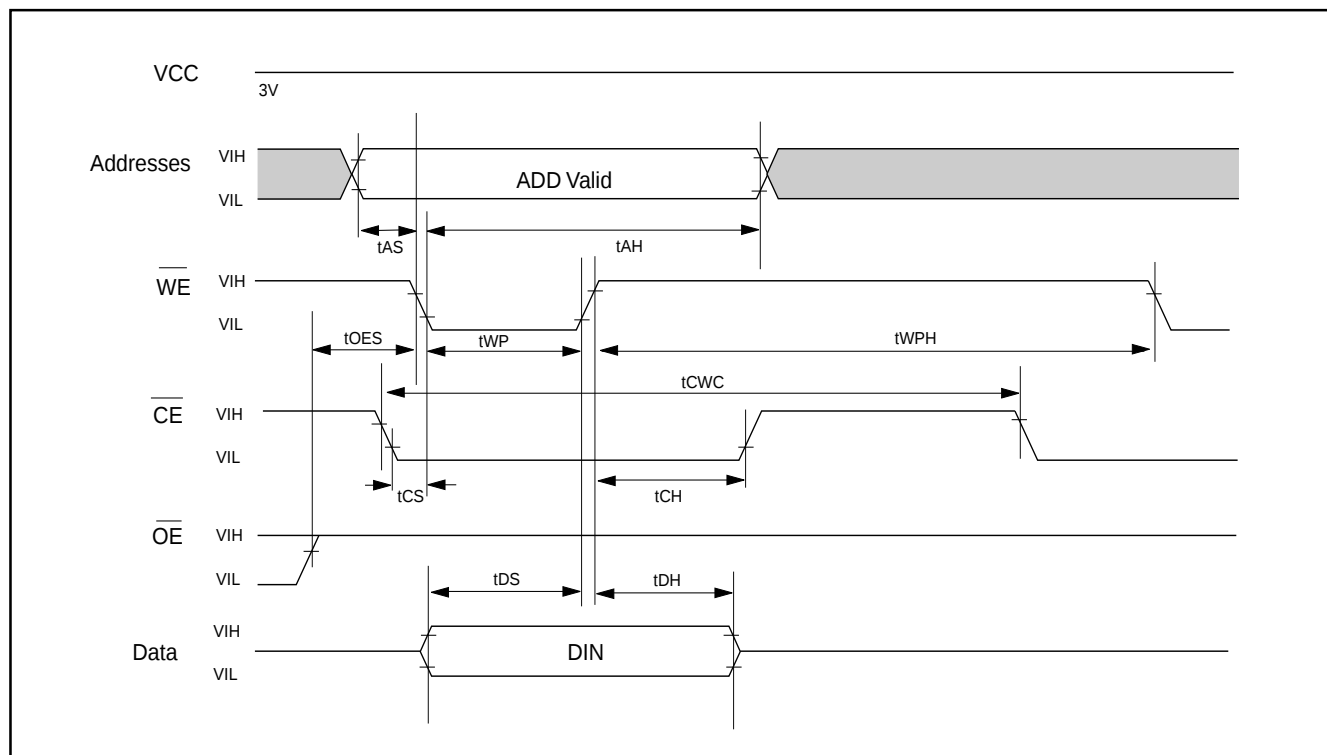

Figure 5. AUTOMATIC PROGRAMMING TIMING WAVEFORM

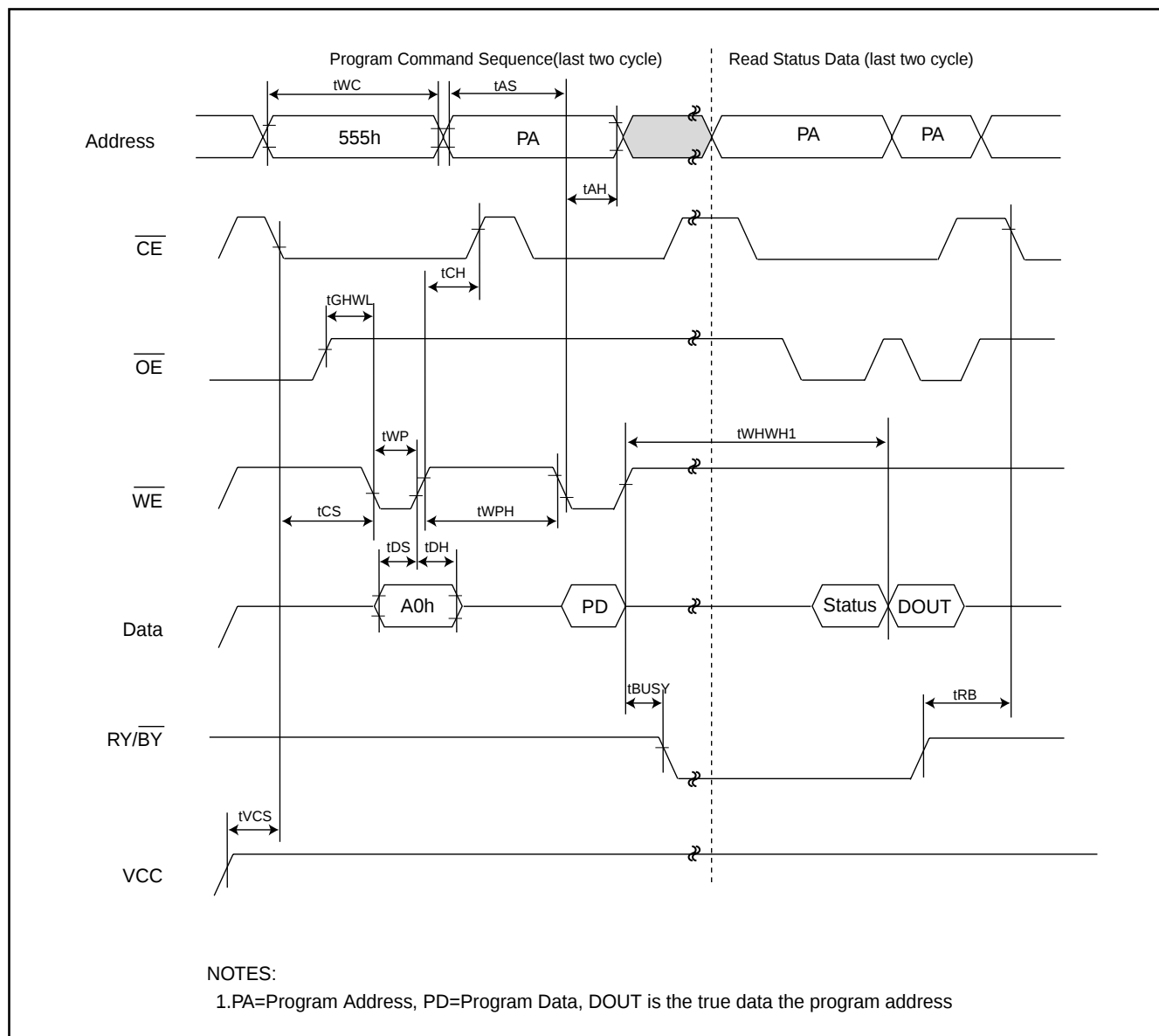


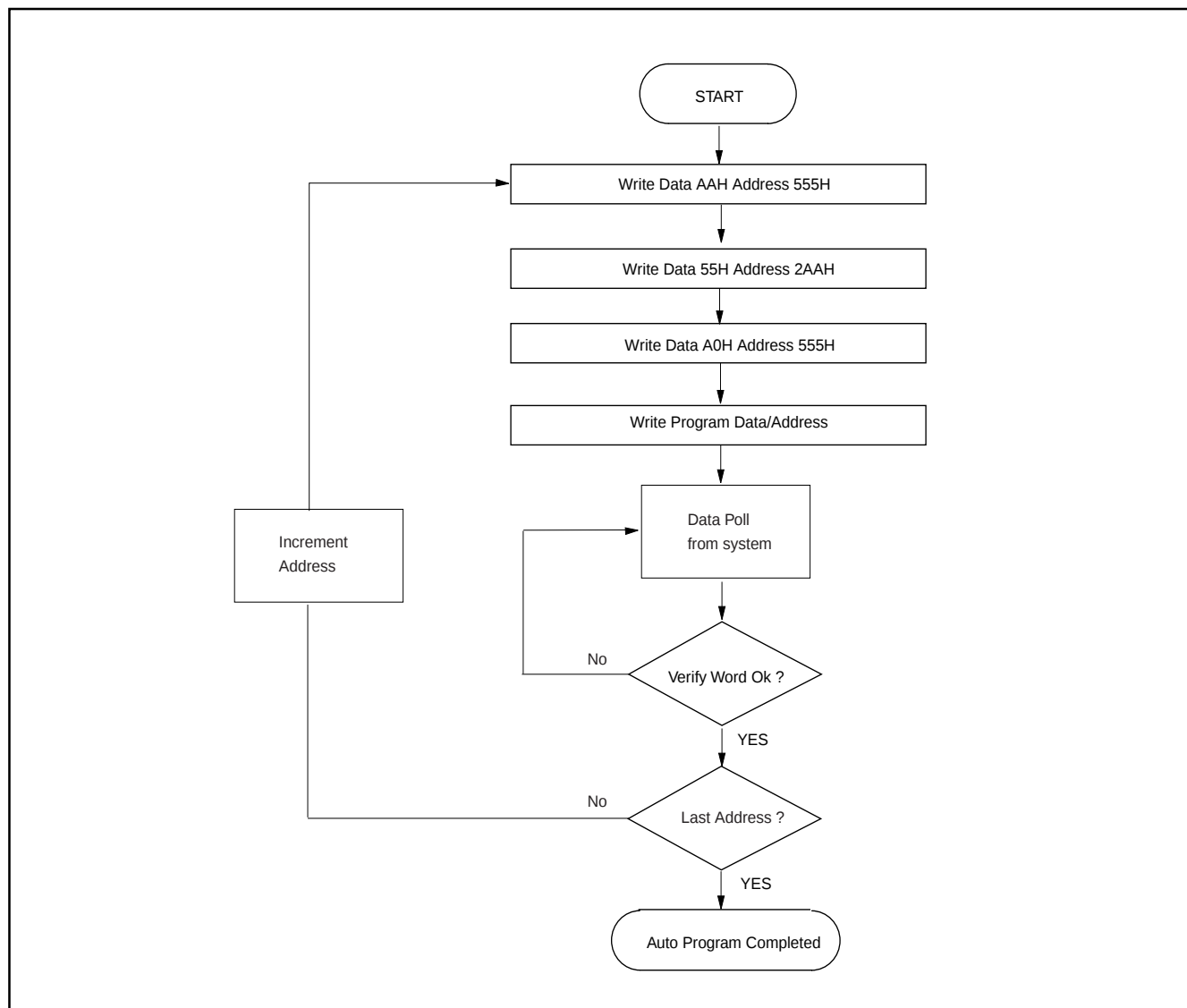
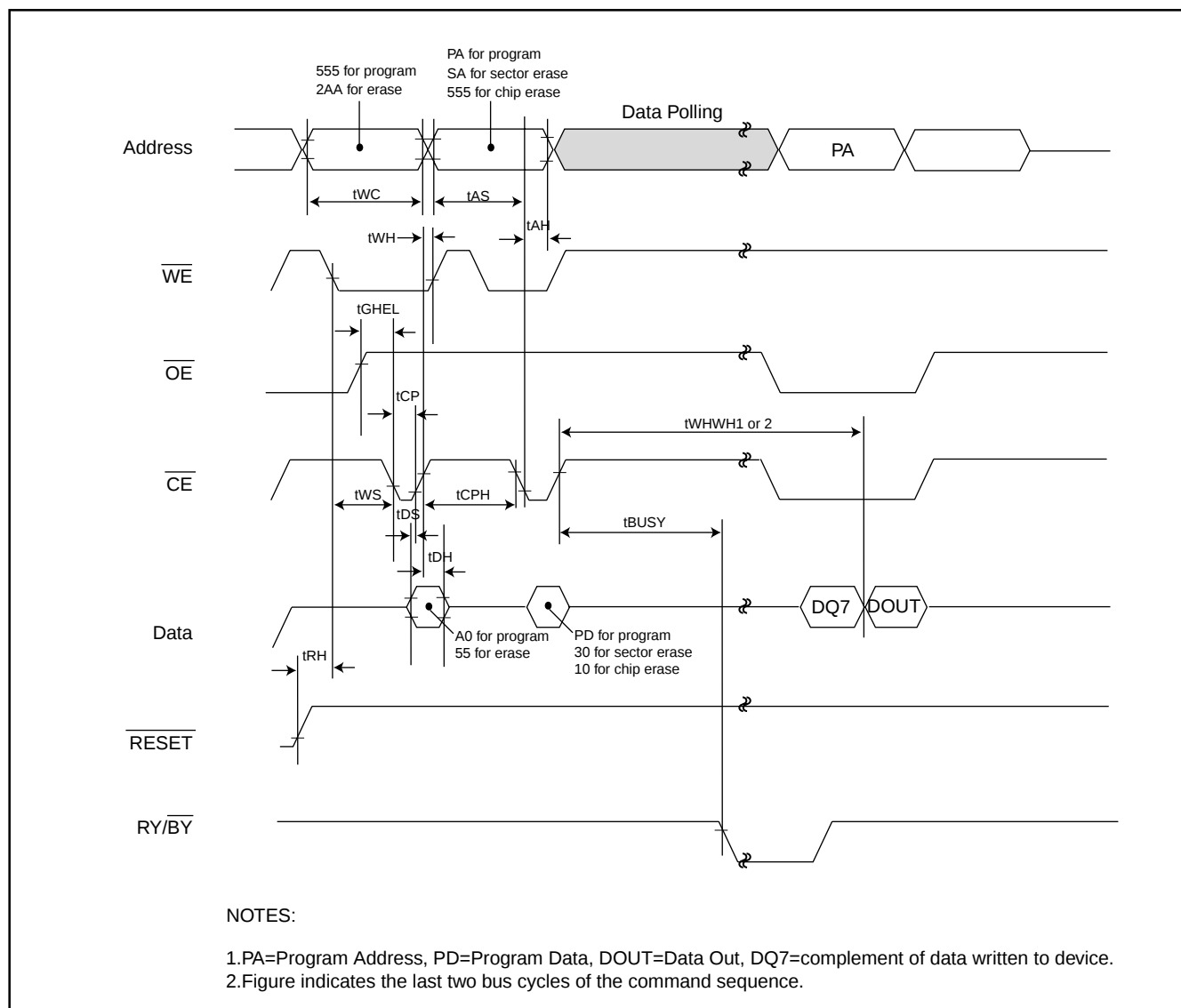
Figure 6. AUTOMATIC PROGRAMMING ALGORITHM FLOWCHART

Figure 8. AUTOMATIC CHIP ERASE TIMING WAVEFORM

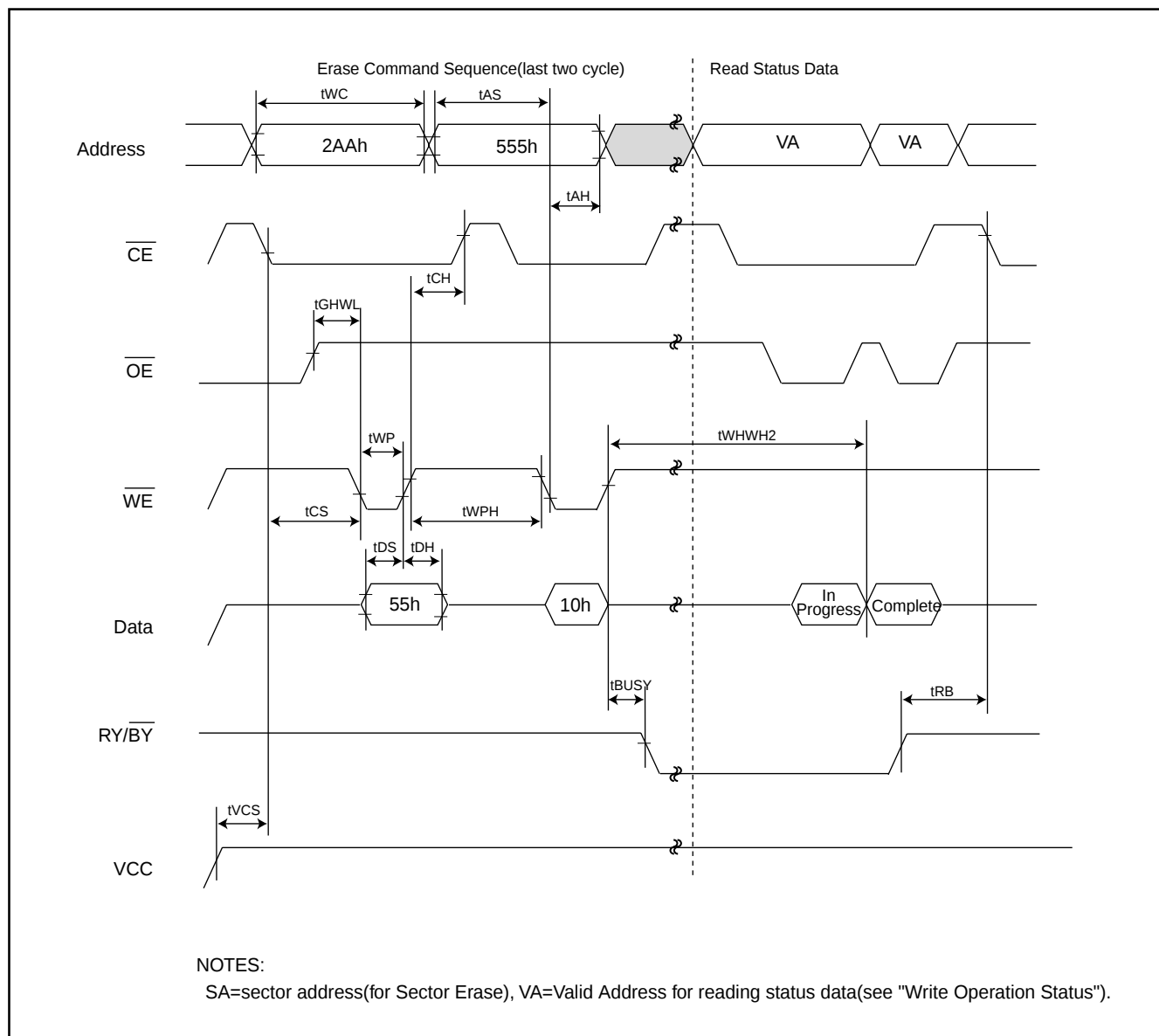
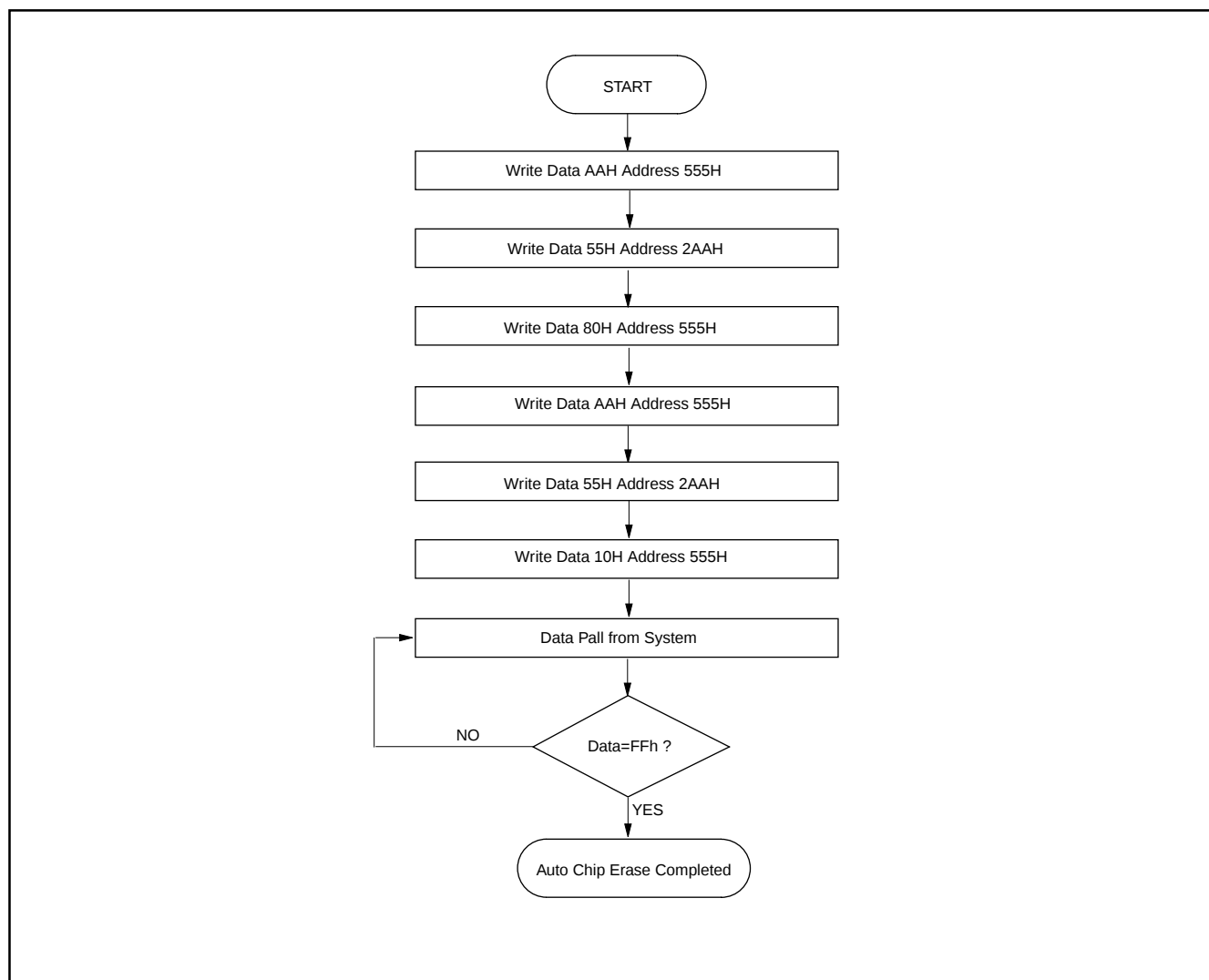


Figure 9. AUTOMATIC CHIP ERASE ALGORITHM FLOWCHART

Figure 10. AUTOMATIC SECTOR ERASE TIMING WAVEFORM

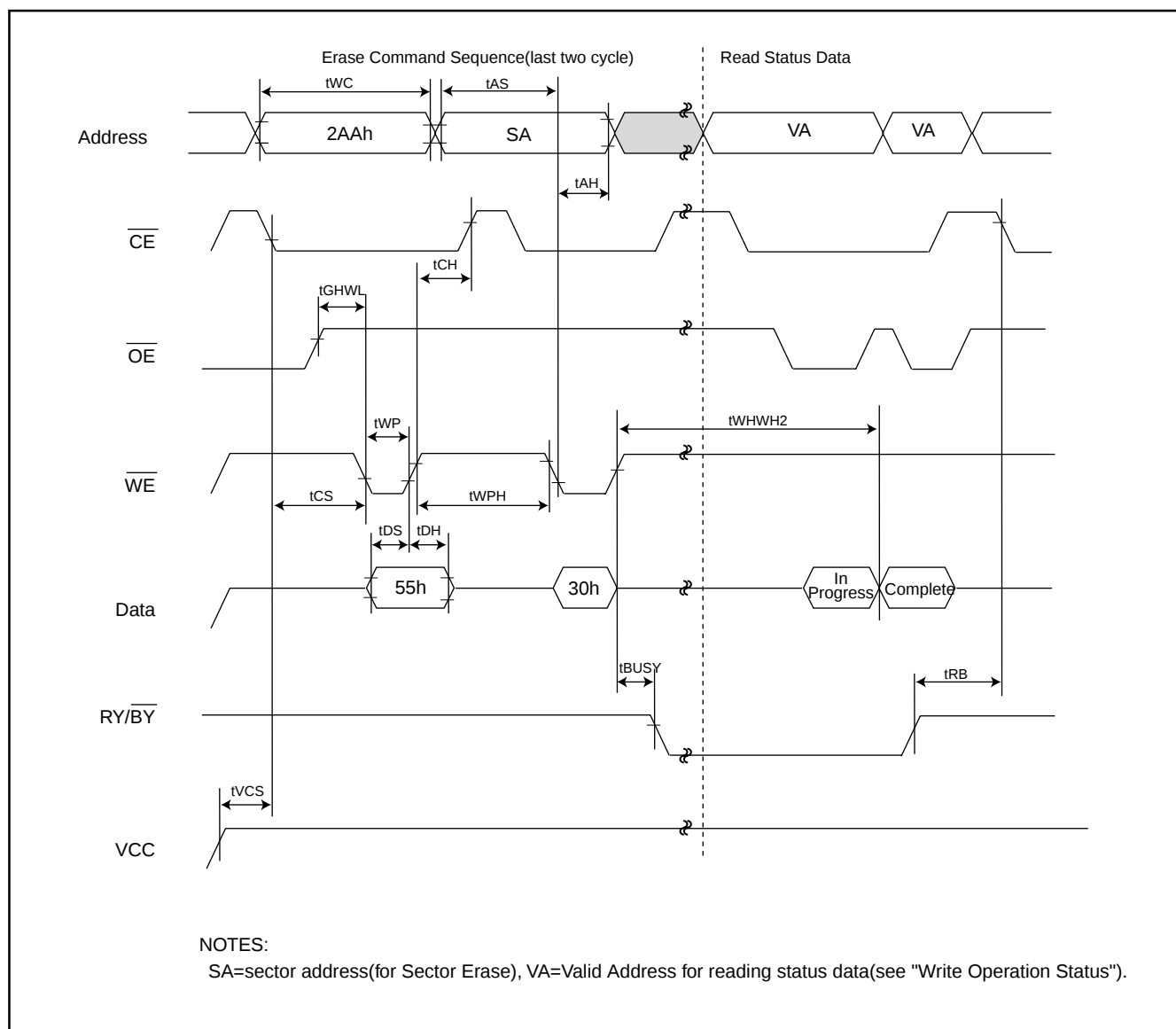


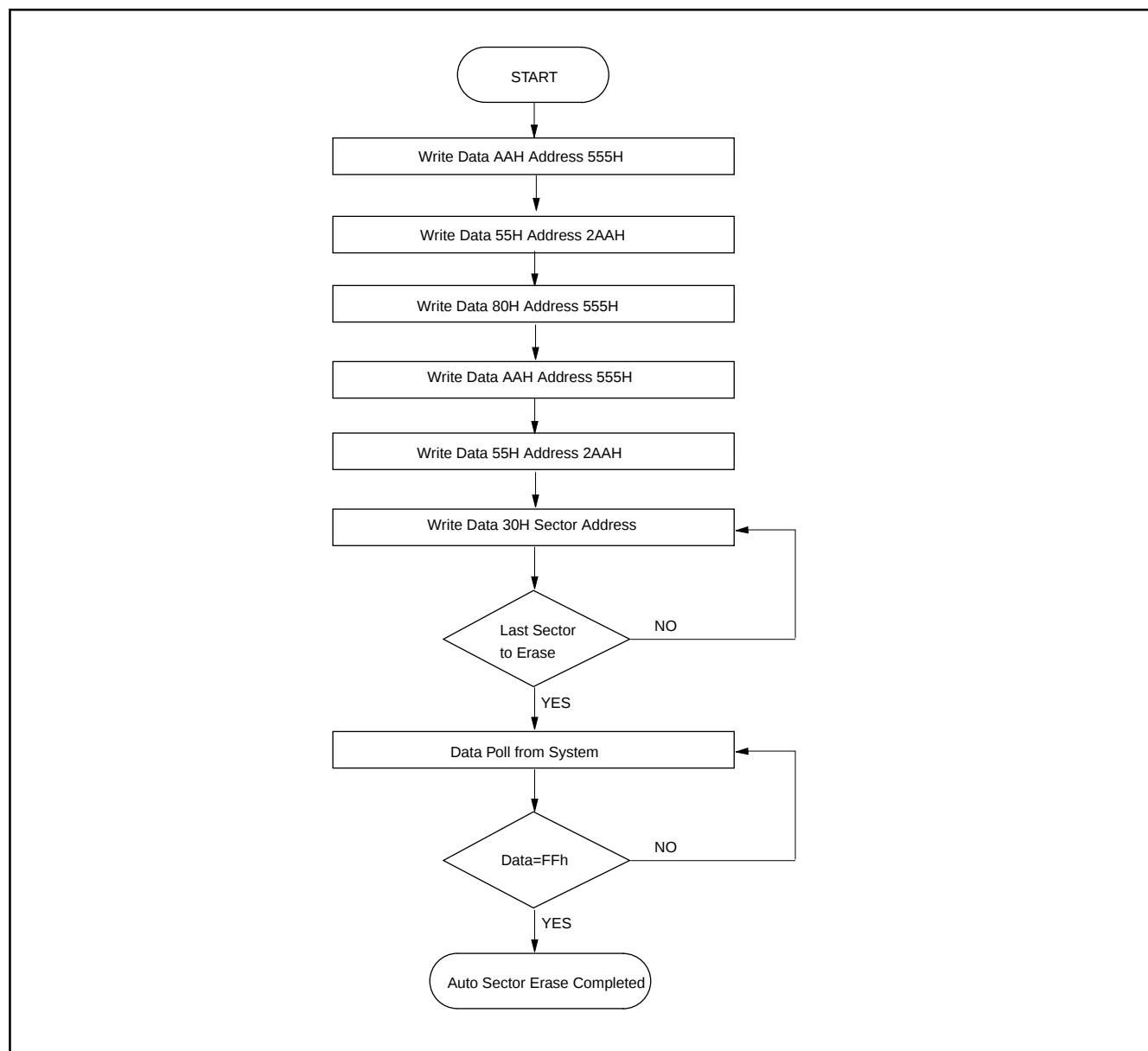
Figure 11. AUTOMATIC SECTOR ERASE ALGORITHM FLOWCHART

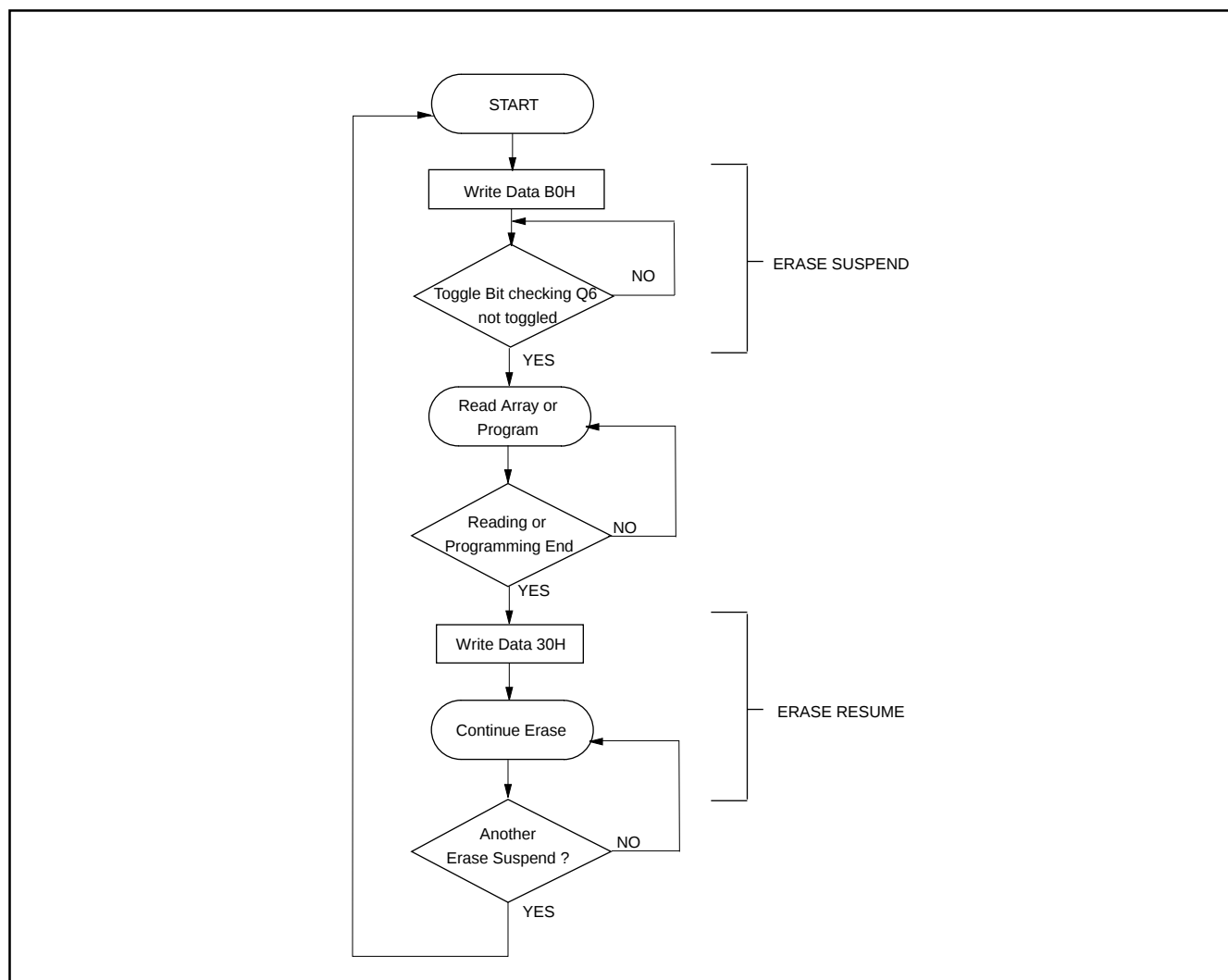
Figure 12. ERASE SUSPEND/ERASE RESUME FLOWCHART


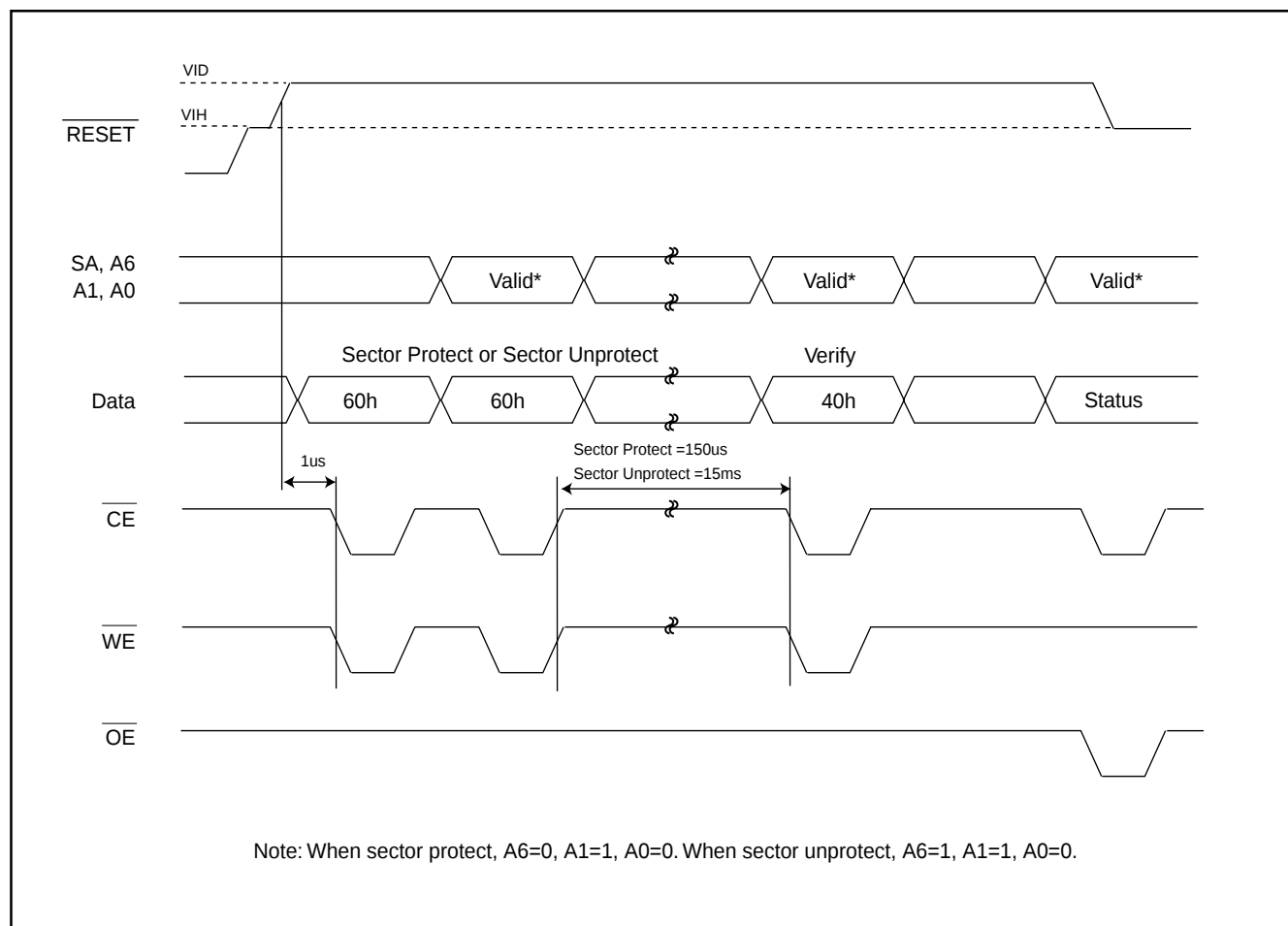
Figure 13. IN-SYSTEM SECTOR PROTECT/UNPROTECT TIMING WAVEFORM (RESET Control)


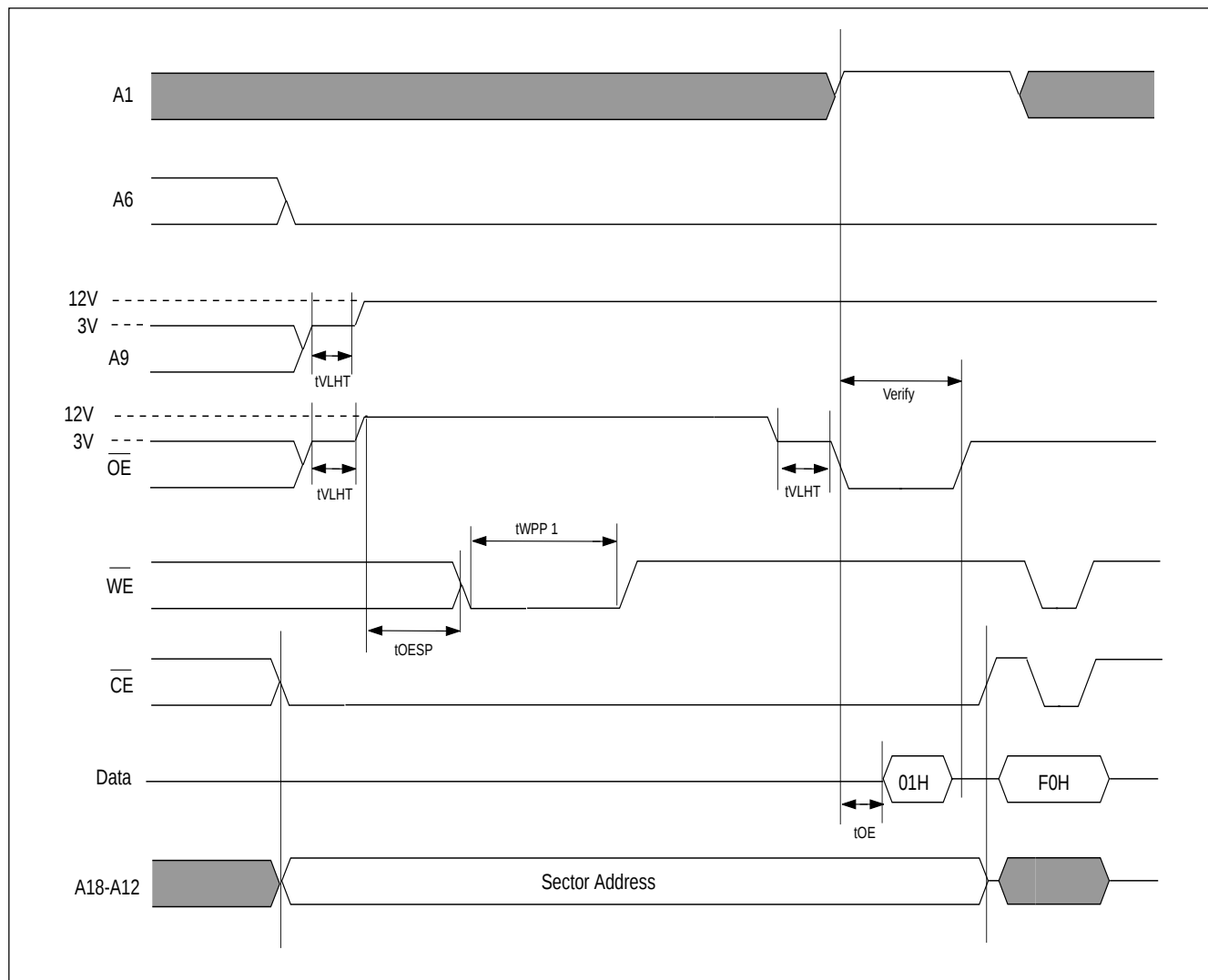
Figure 14. SECTOR PROTECT TIMING WAVEFORM(A9, $\overline{\text{OE}}$ Control)


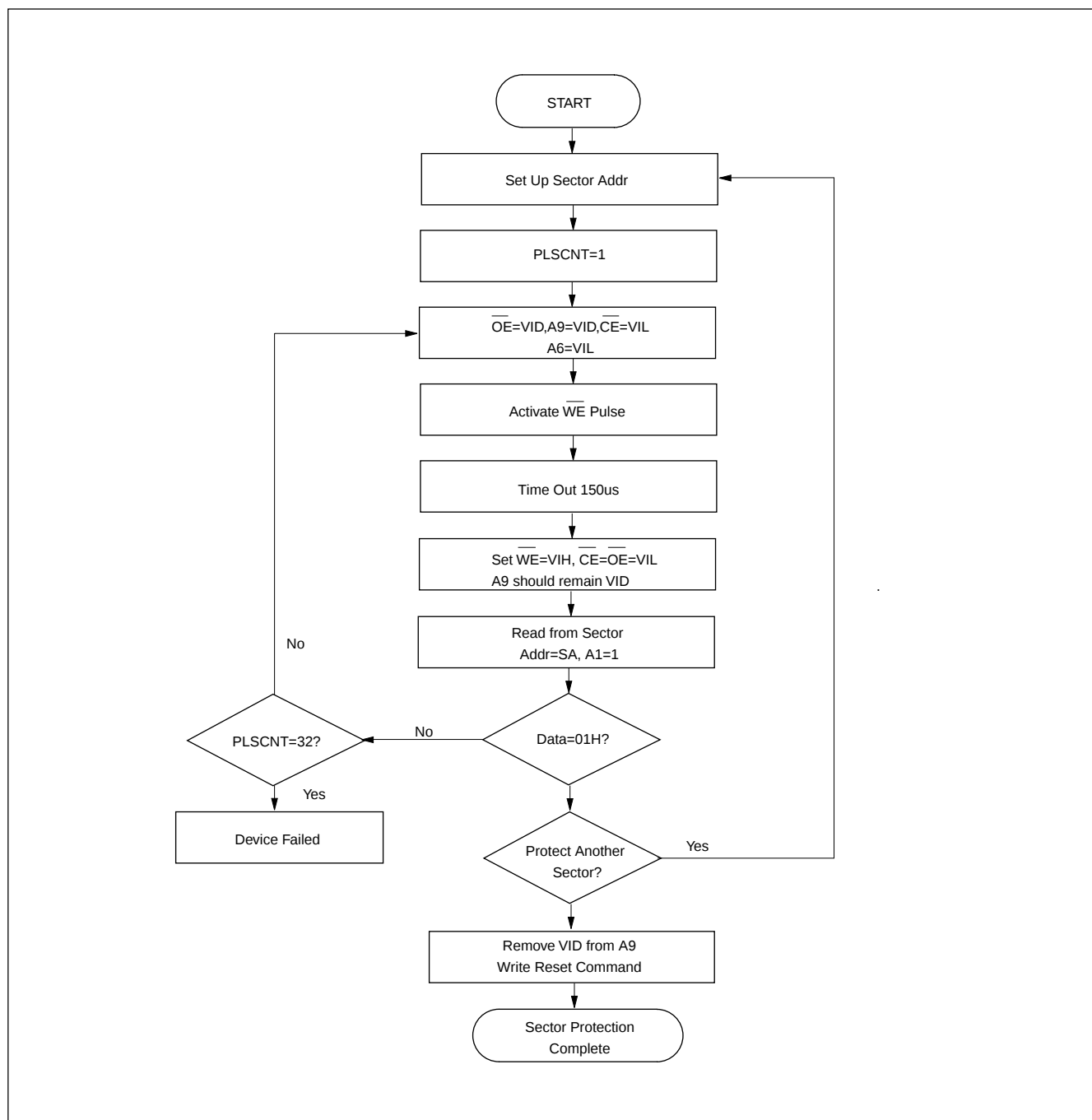
Figure 15. SECTOR PROTECTION ALGORITHM (A9, $\overline{OE}$ Control)


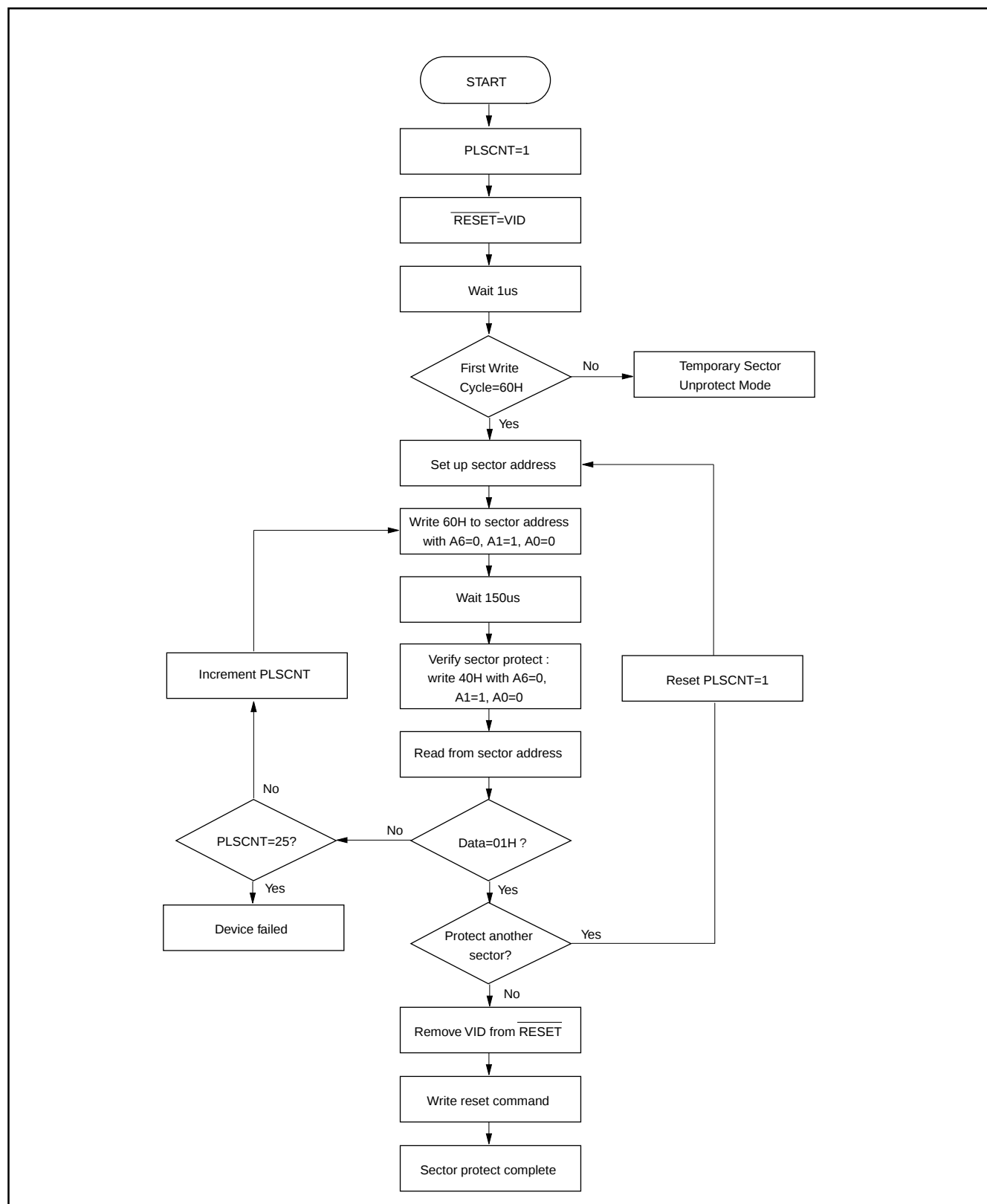
Figure 16. IN-SYSTEM SECTOR PROTECTION ALGORITHM WITH $\overline{\text{RESET}}=\text{VID}$


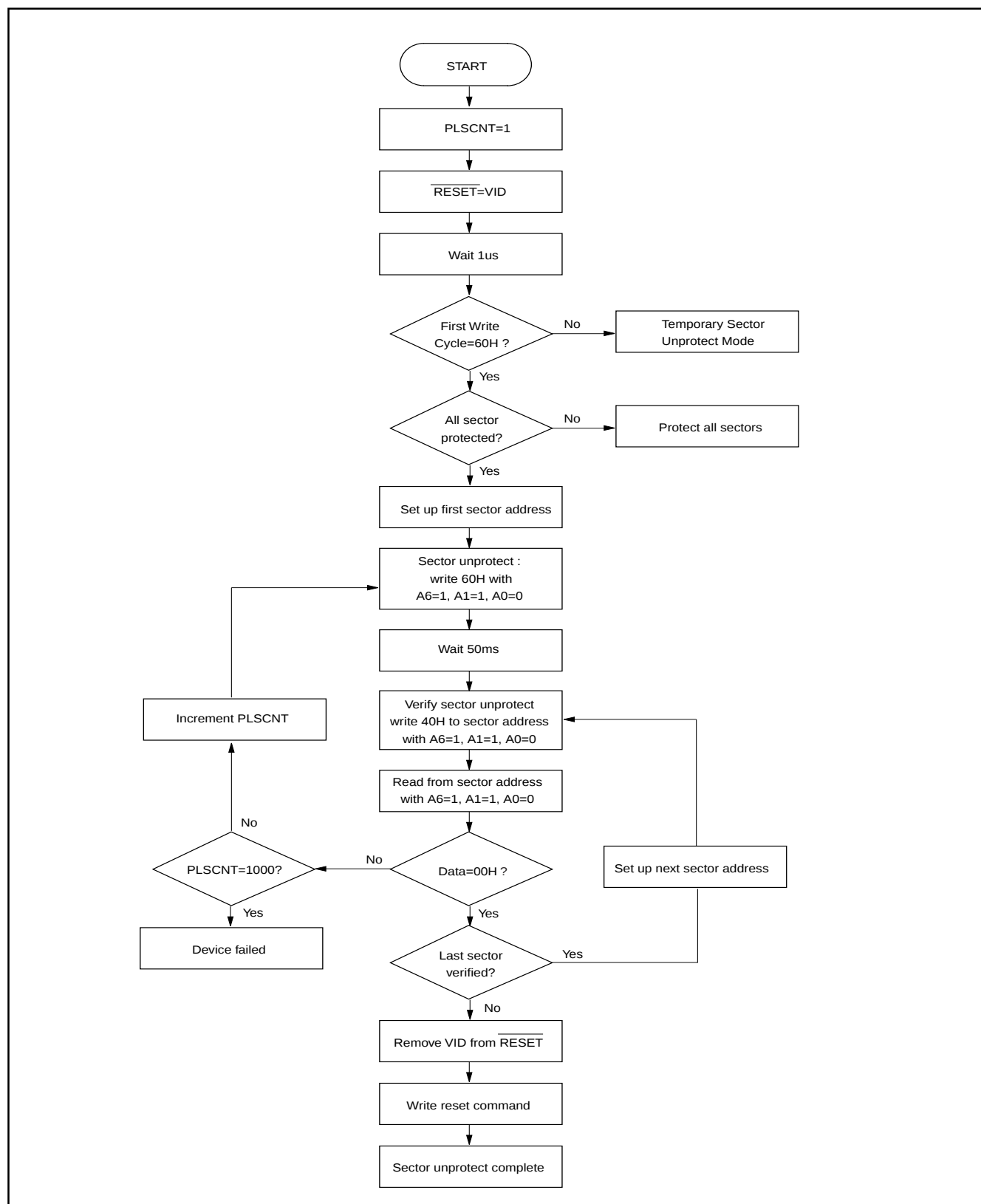
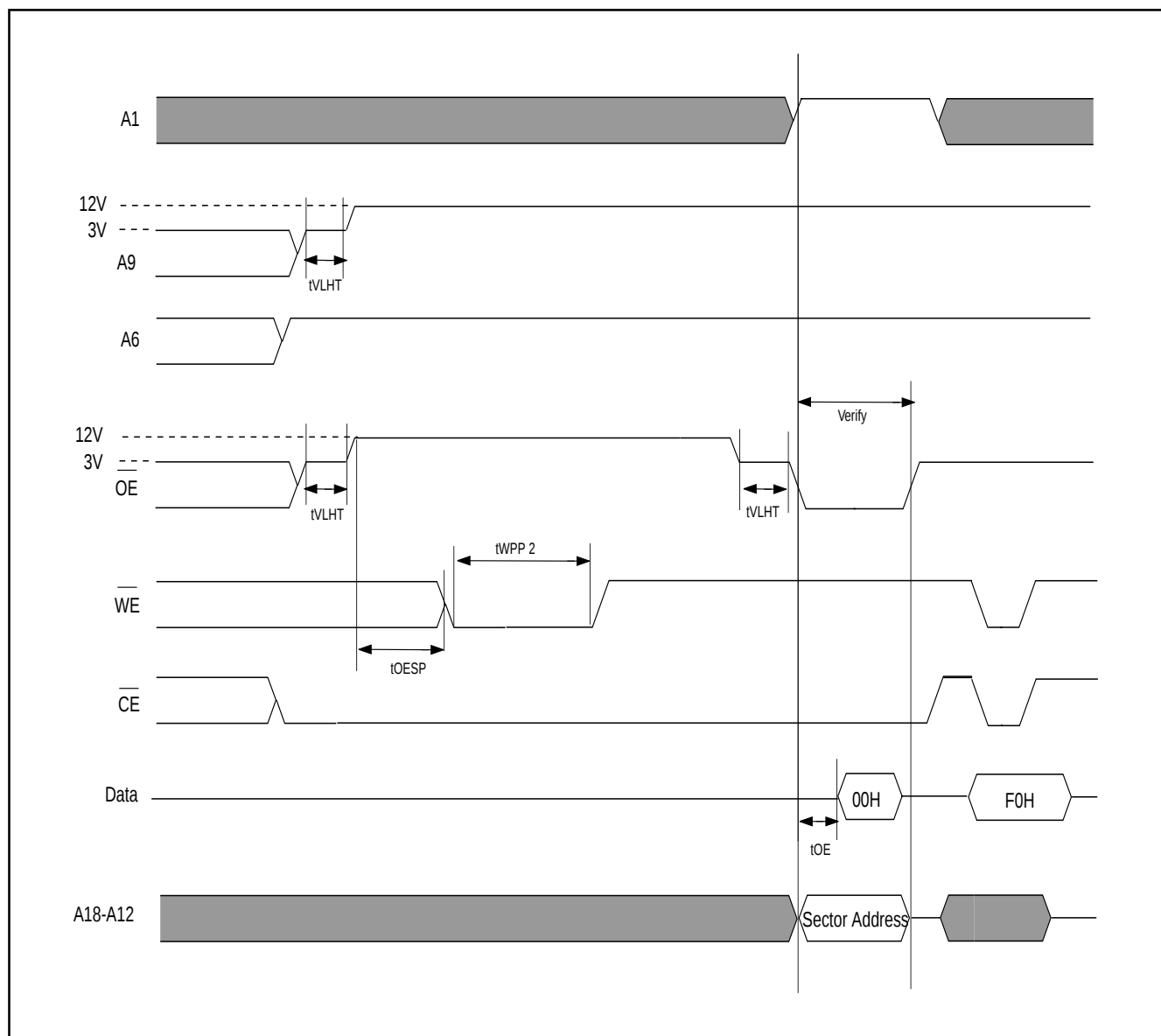
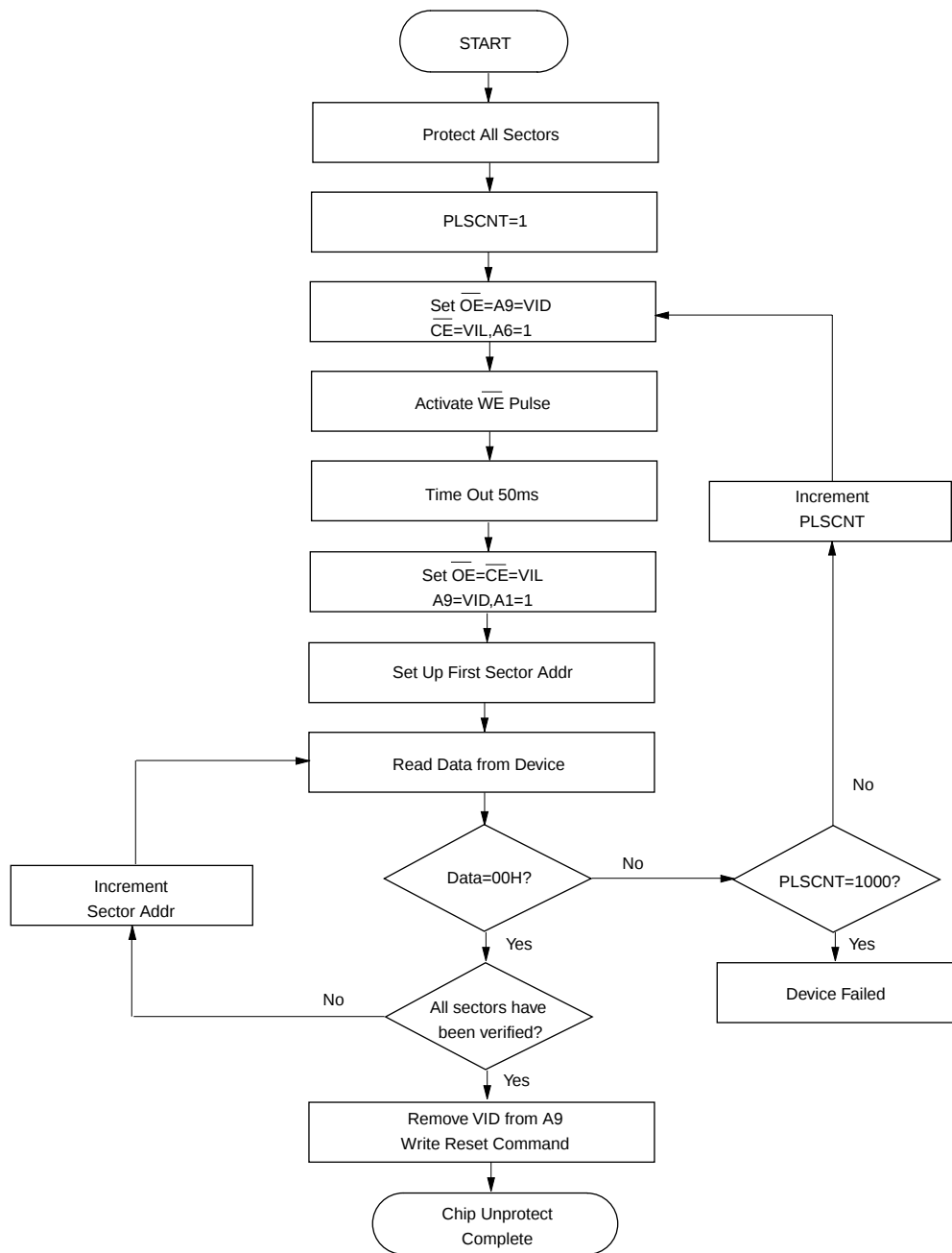
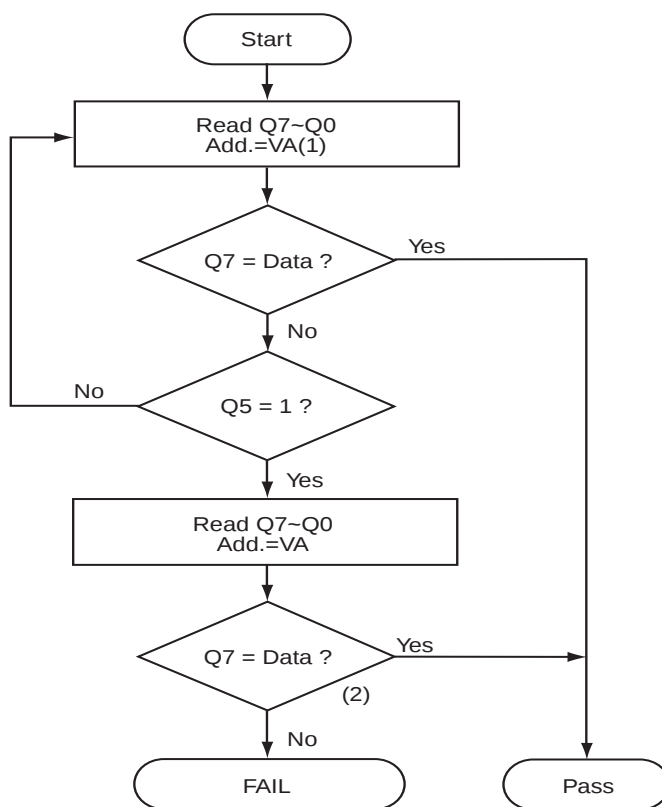
Figure 17. IN-SYSTEM SECTOR UNPROTECTION ALGORITHM WITH $\overline{\text{RESET}}=\text{VID}$

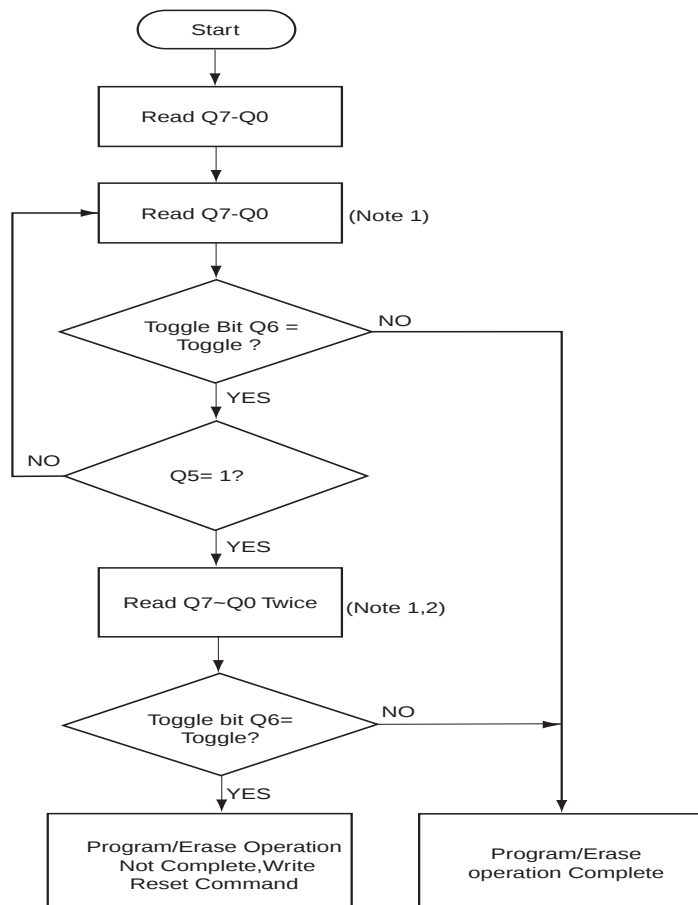
Figure 19. CHIP UNPROTECTION ALGORITHM (A9, $\overline{OE}$ Control)

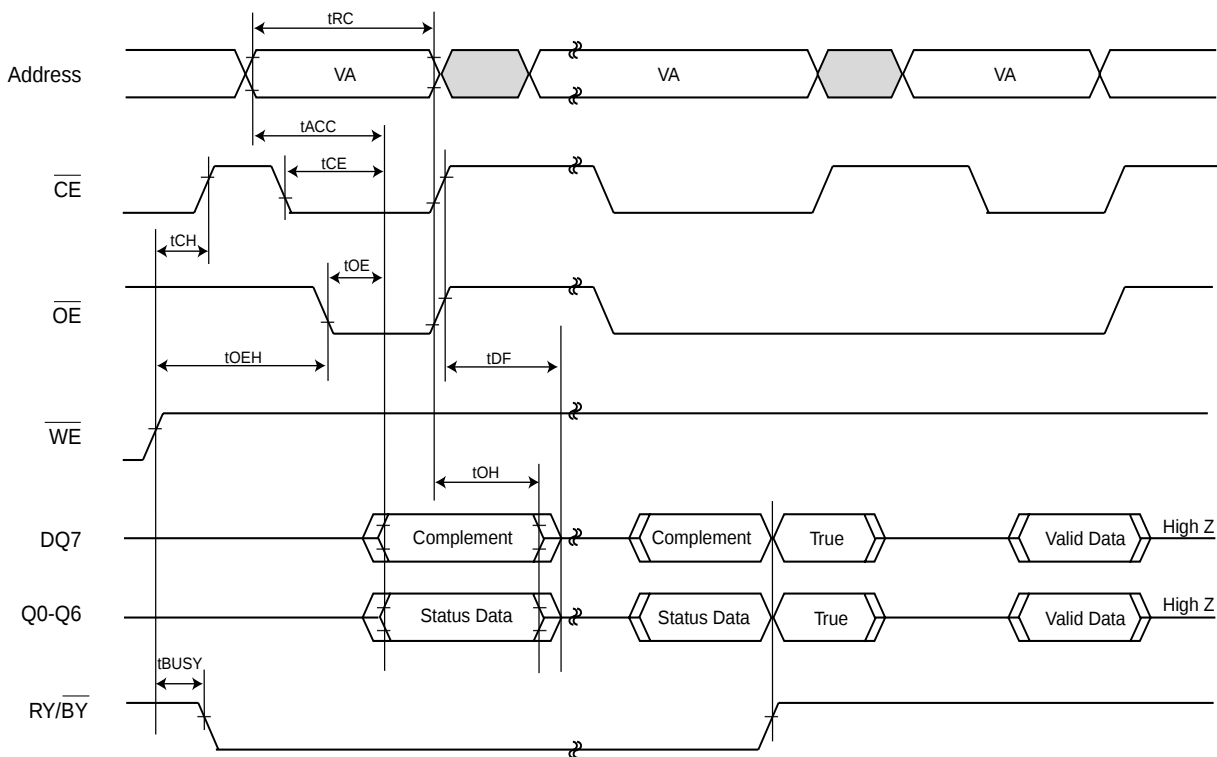

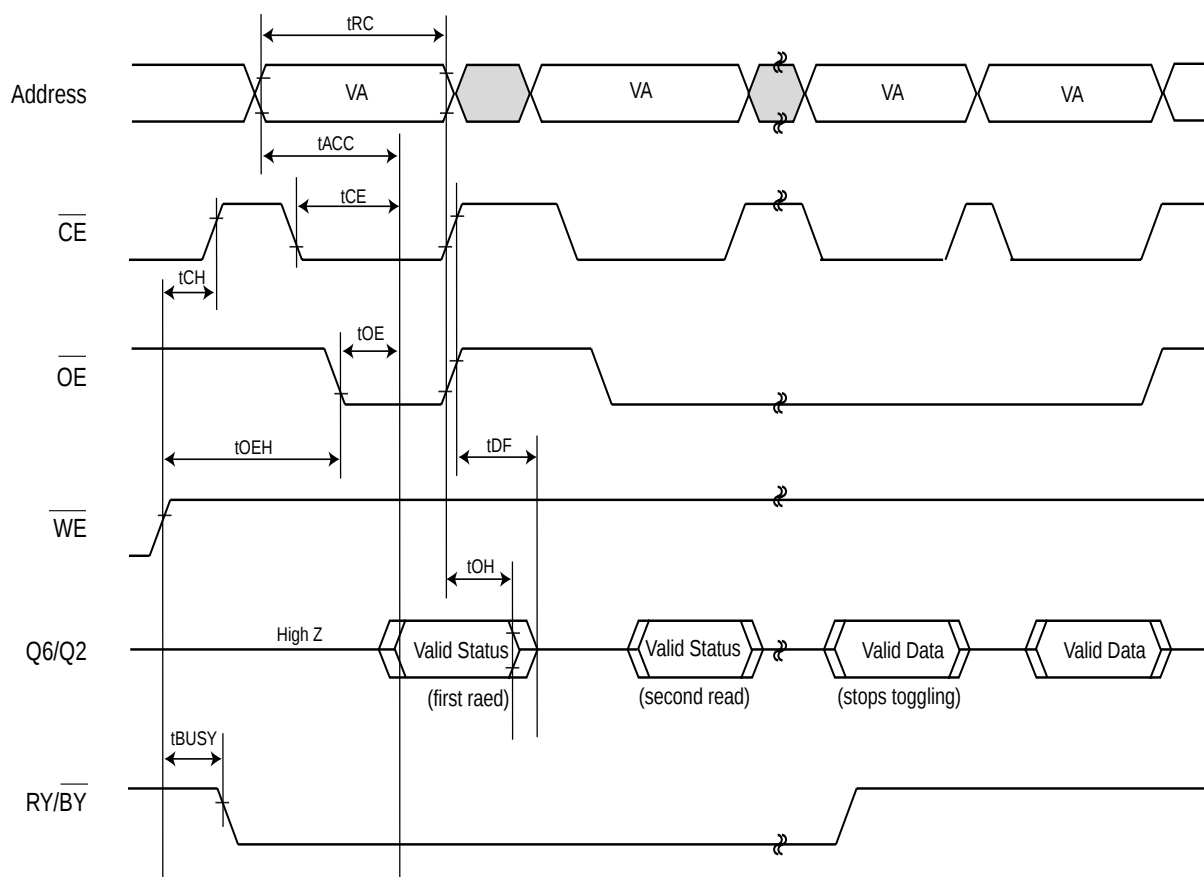

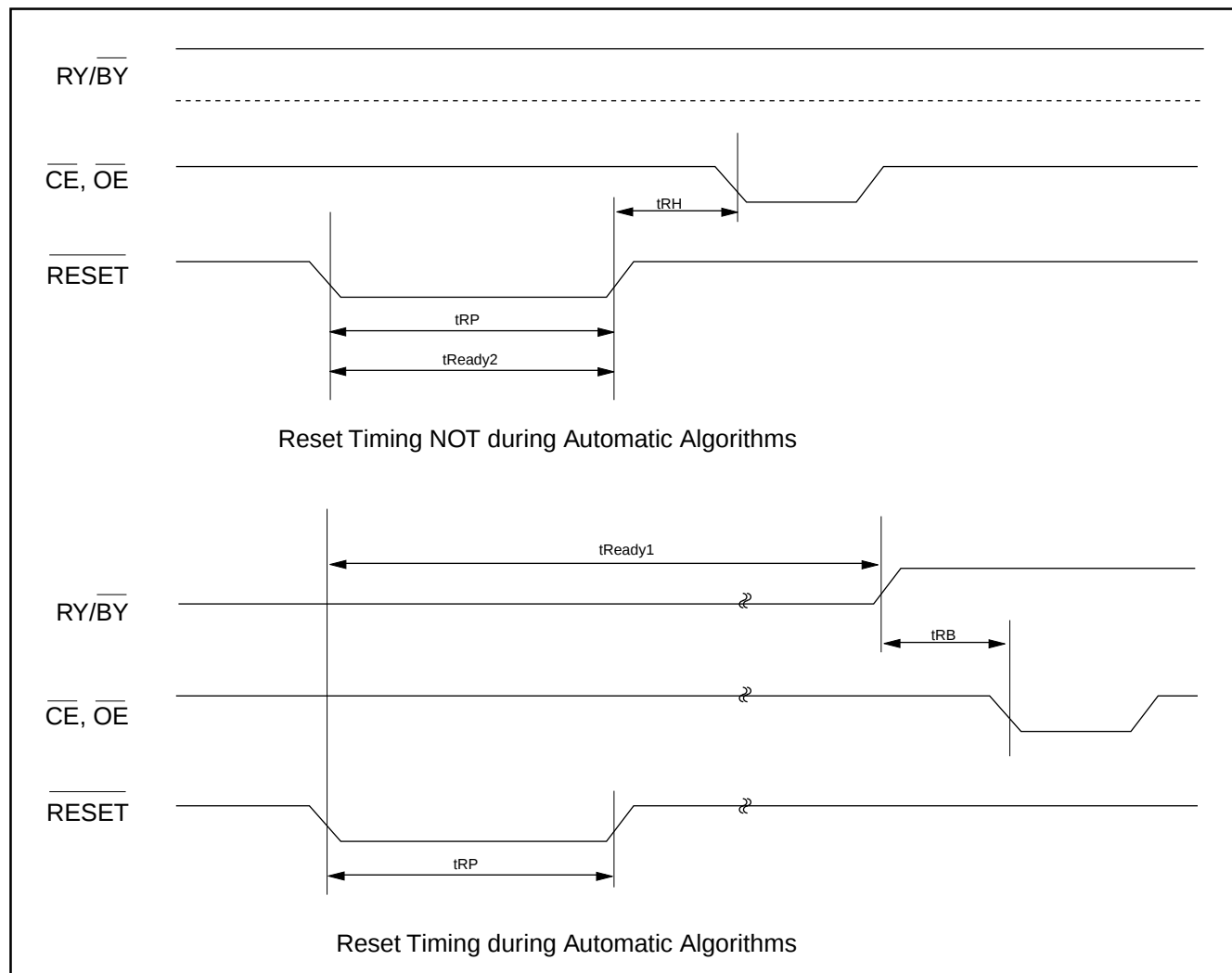
Figure 23. TOGGLE BIT TIMING WAVEFORMS (DURING AUTOMATIC ALOGRITHMS)

Figure 25. BYTE TIMING WAVEFORM FOR READ OPERATIONS (BYTE switching from byte mode to word mode)

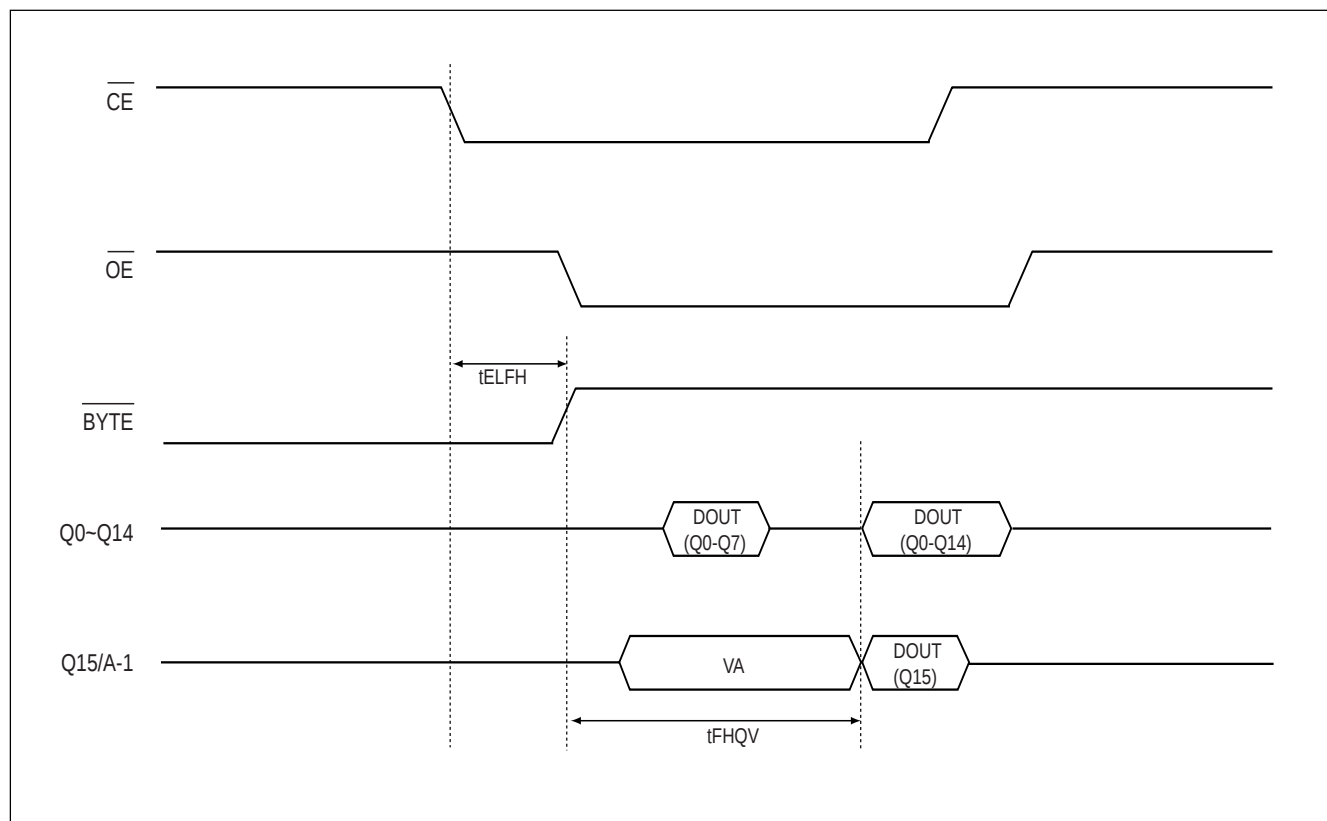


Figure 26. $\overline{\text{BYTE}}$ TIMING WAVEFORM FOR READ OPERATIONS ($\overline{\text{BYTE}}$ switching from word mode to byte mode)

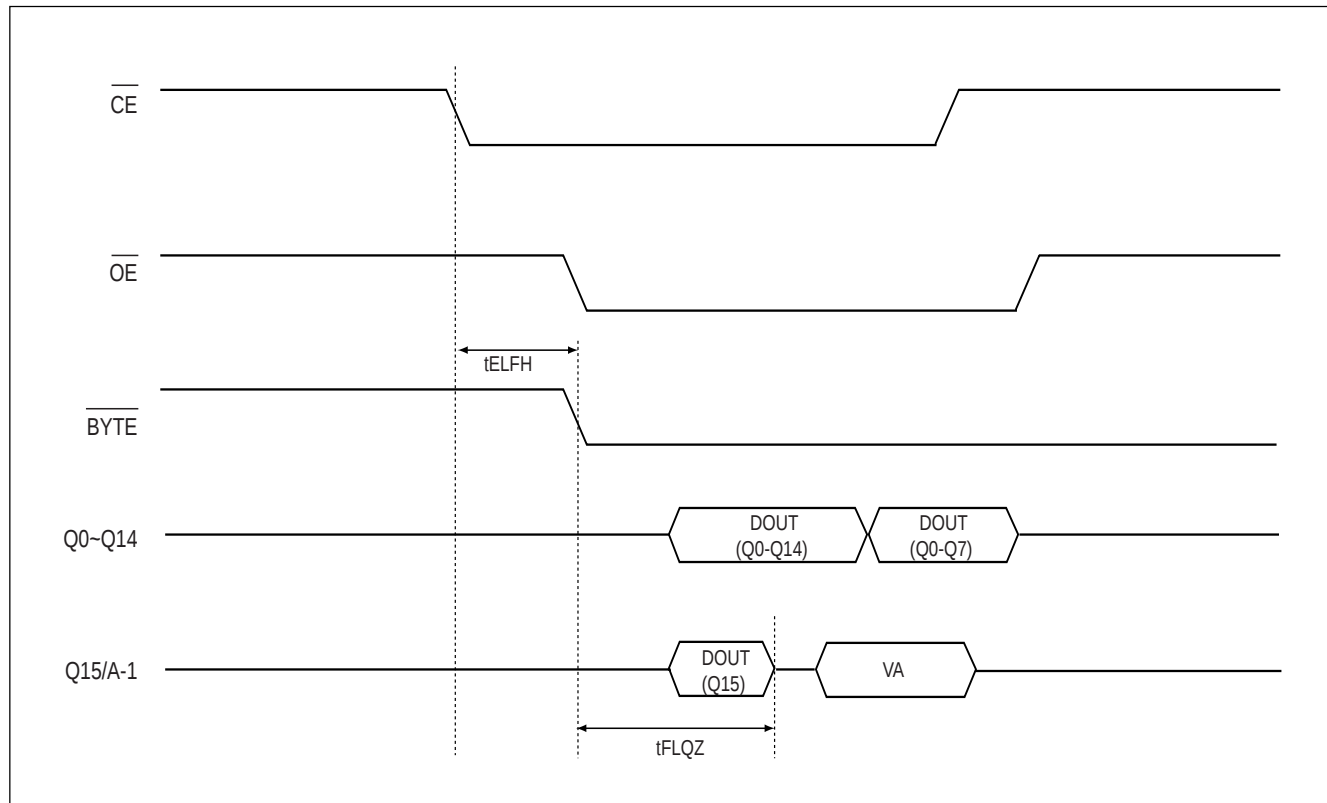


Figure 27. $\overline{\text{BYTE}}$ TIMING WAVEFORM FOR PROGRAM OPERATIONS

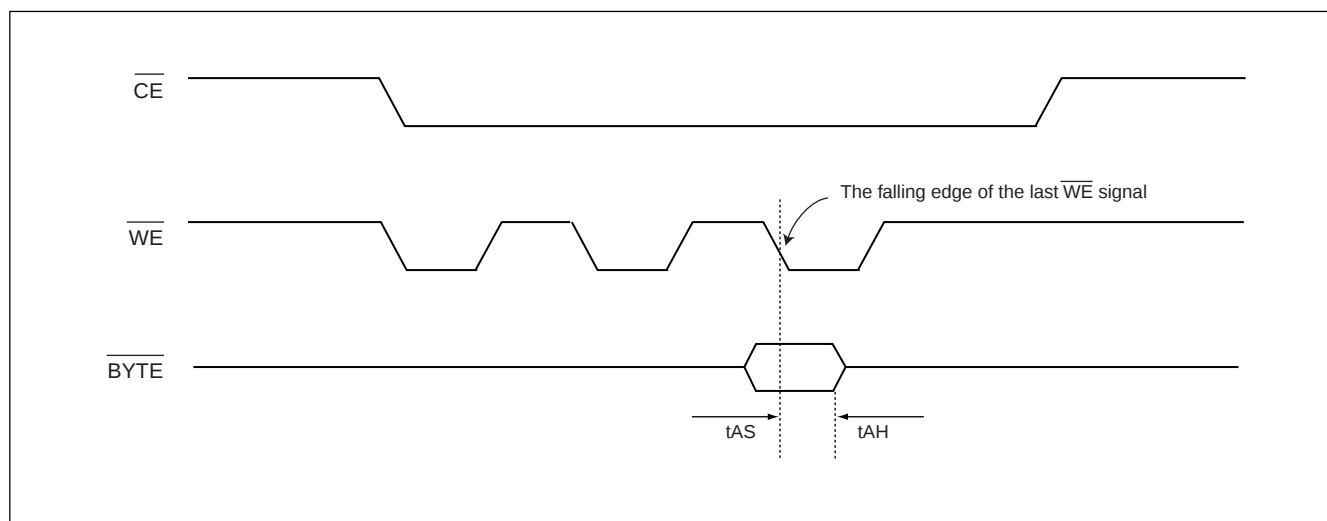

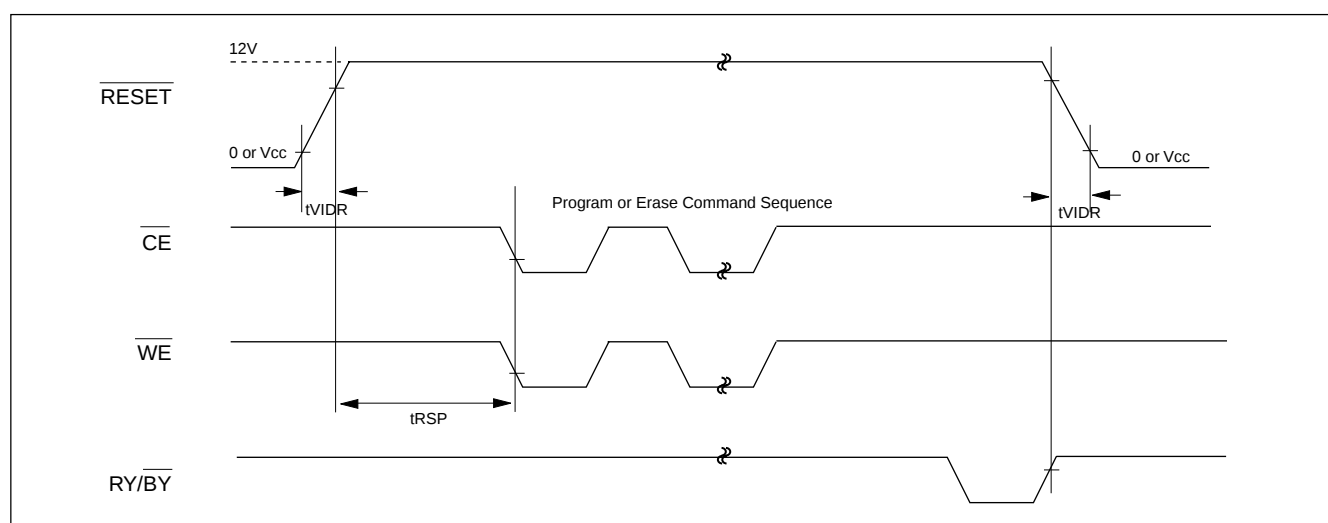
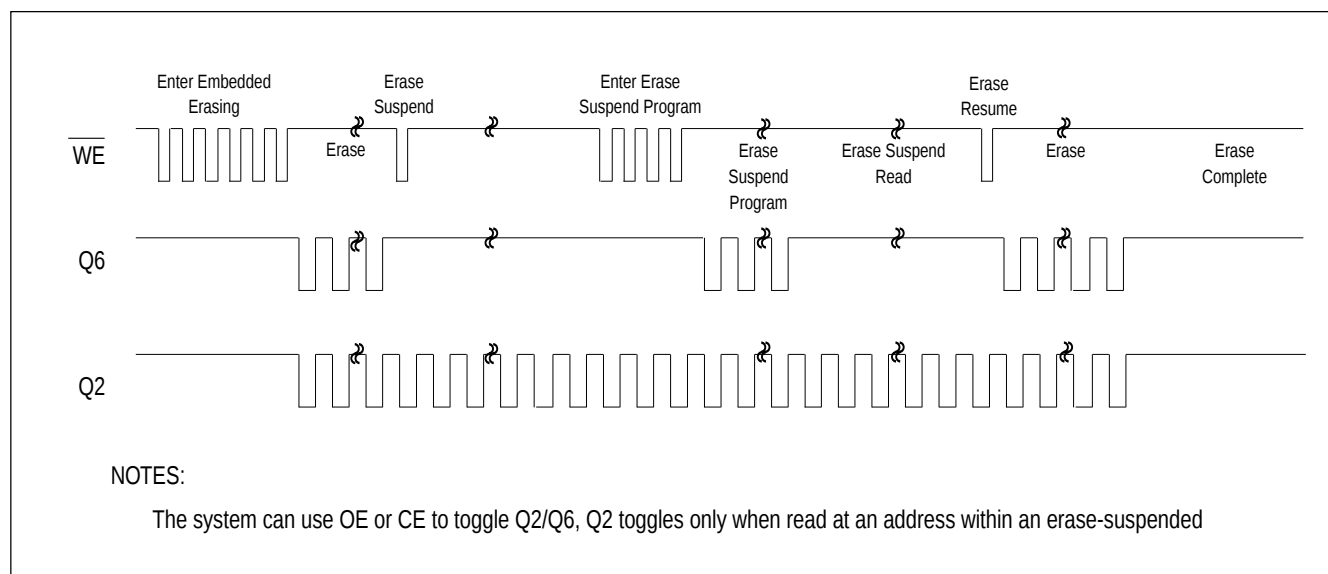
Figure 28. TEMPORARY SECTOR UNPROTECT TIMING DIAGRAM

Figure 29. Q6 vs Q2 for Erase and Erase Suspend Operations


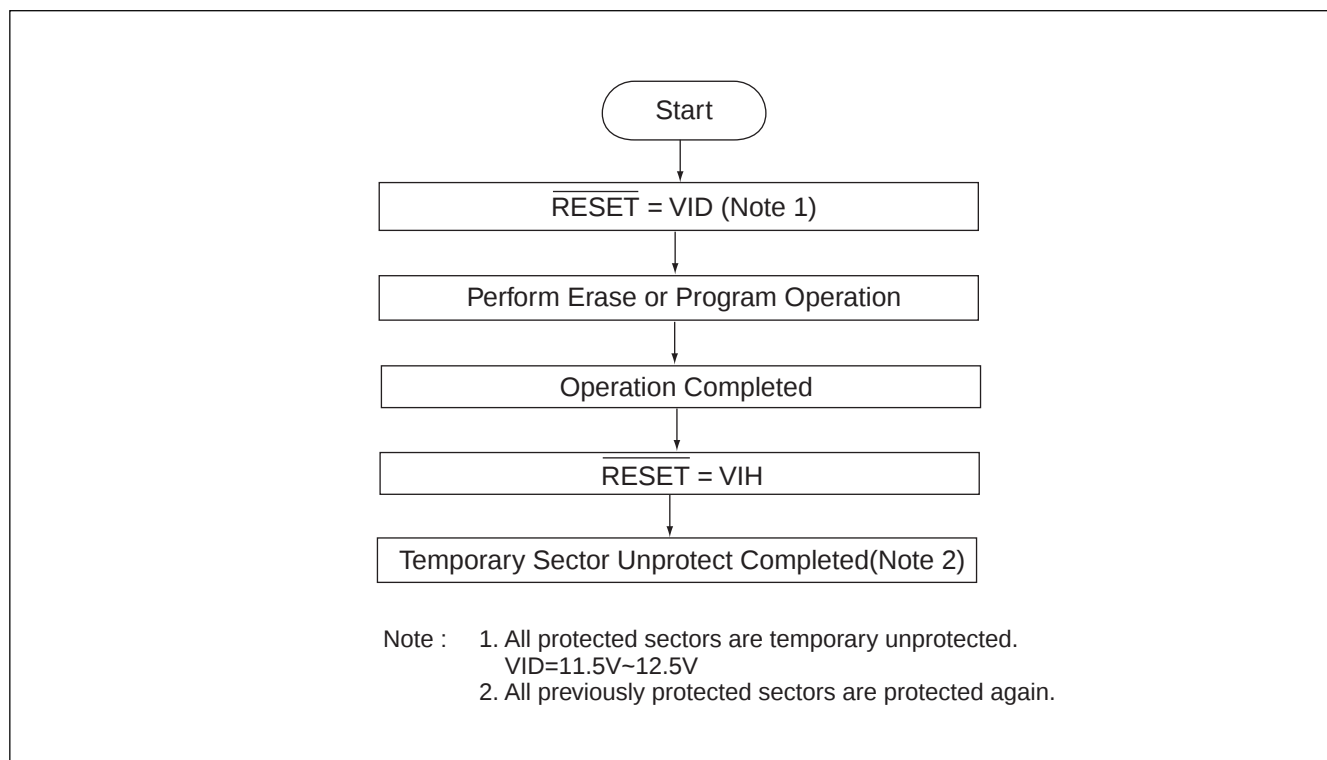
Figure 30. TEMPORARY SECTOR UNPROTECT ALGORITHM

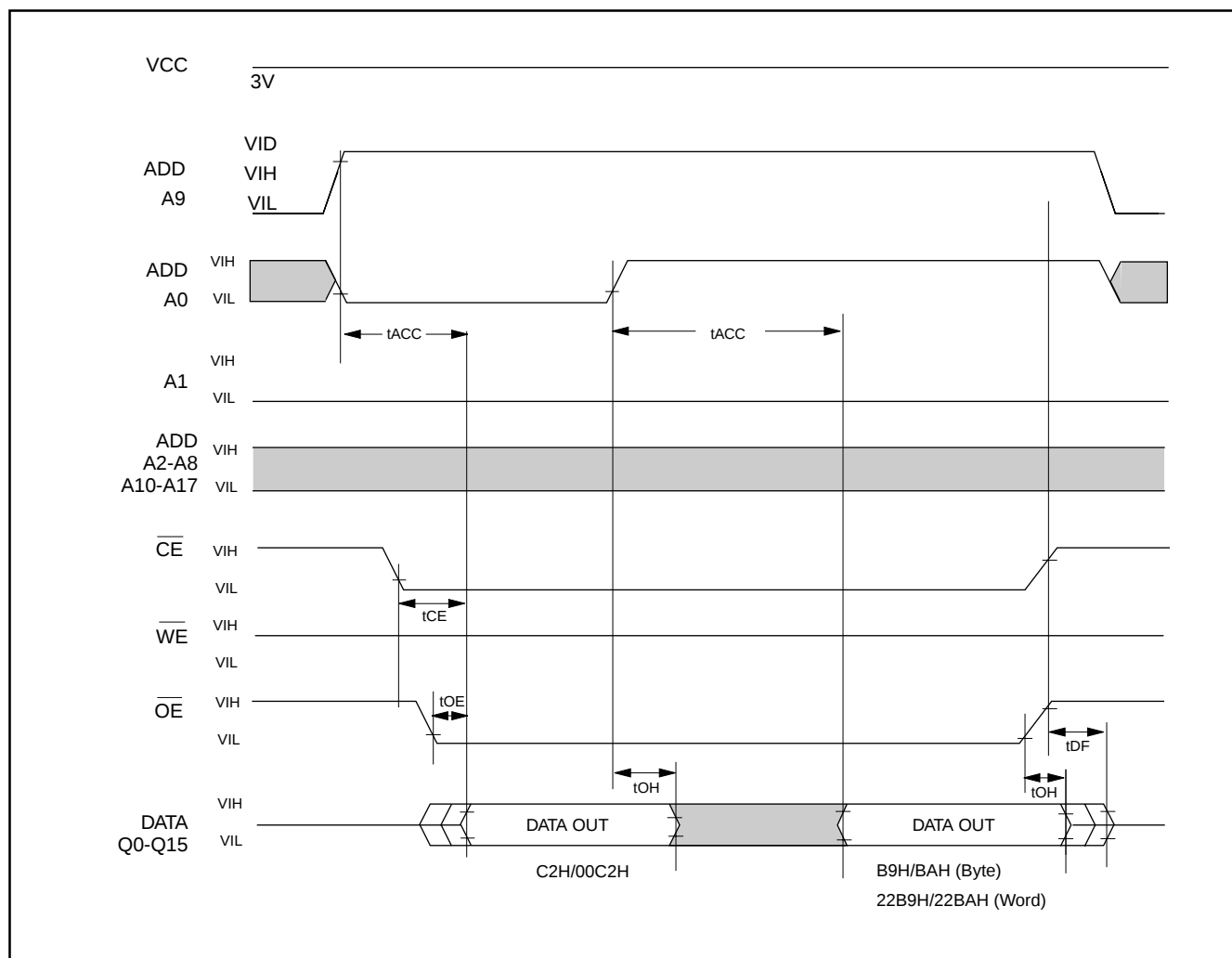
Figure 31. ID CODE READ TIMING WAVEFORM

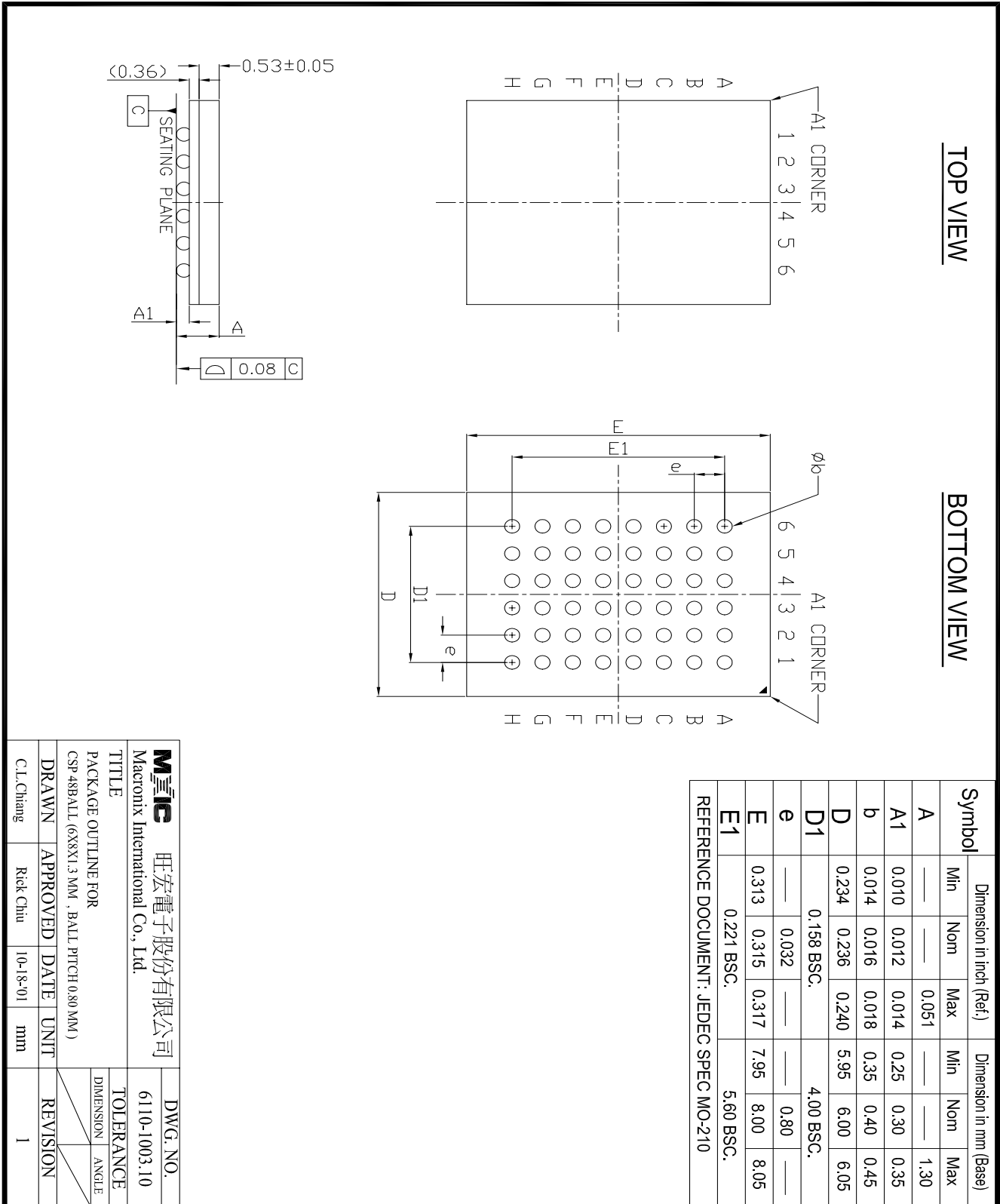
